Air quality across city deteriorates to hazardous levels on Deepavali

Hyderabad's air quality deteriorated to hazardous levels on Thursday night as citizens celebrated Deepavali with gusto, bursting crackers and lighting fireworks. The 10 p.m. outer limit for bursting crackers imposed by the Hyderabad Police went for a toss as aerial pyrotechnics lit up the

The particulate matter pollution of 2.5 microns/ m3 (PM2.5) reached a high of 475 at the U.S. Consulate observatory; in Kapra it reached 454, and in the partially functioning monitoring station of Sanathnagar, it was 472. Five of the Central Pollution Control Board real-time monitoring stations at Zoo Park. Bollarum, Patancheru, Somajiguda and Sanathnagar went offline just as the air

quality began to deteriorate around 10 p.m.

The PM10, or particulate matter of 10 microns/ m3, reached a high of 605 at Ramachandrapuram on the fringes of the city. The pollution levels peaked after 10 p.m. before dropping back to the normal range. The Sanathnagar observatory logged the maximum of 472 PM2.5 after it came back online at 1

a.m. on Friday. It shows a blank between 10 p.m. and 1 a.m. for PM2.5 while it was recording other parameters like nitrogen dioxide, Sulphur dioxide, carbon monoxide and ozone. In 2022, the Sanathnagar monitoring station was the only functioning monitoring station and it had recorded PM2.5 at 759 at 10 p.m. on October 24, Deepavali that year.

GST receipts' growth picks up again, but still off target

Revenues surpass ₹1.87 lakh crore in October, marking the second highest monthly collections; despite improved figure, the accruals so far continue to undershoot Budget 2024-25 estimates



ndia's Gross Goods and Services Tax (GST) collections surpassed ₹1.87 lakh crore in October, marking the second highest monthly collections on record, with growth rebounding to 8.9% in October from September's 40-month low uptick of 6.5%.

Net revenues, after factoring in refunds, grew at a slower pace of 7.9% to a tad over ₹1.68 lakh crore in October. However, this also marked a recovery from September's growth rate of 3.9% which was the slowest so far in 2024-25.

Last month's GST revenues were only eclipsed by the April 2024 collection of ₹2.1 lakh crore. Despite the improved growth figure,

GST revenues so far continue to undershoot the Budget 2024-25 math, which factored in a rise of about 11% in net revenues.

In October, growth in gross revenues from domestic transactions proved to 10.6% from about 6% a month earlier. while import revenues

grew at a much milder pace of 3.9% in October, halving from September's 8% uptick. Net domestic receipts in October, from transactions in September, were up 8.7%, almost dou-

ble the 4.5% recorded in the preceding month. Overall revenues from GST, prior to refunds, in

the first seven months of this year, now stand at ₹12.74 lakh crore, 9.4% over the corresponding period of 2023-24. Net revenues, after refunds, are also up 9% at over ₹11.27 lakh

Deep variations Amid the headline improvement in domestic transactions, variations among States deepened significantly relative to the previous month, with a dozen States growing faster than the 10.6% national average growth in domestic revenues, a dozen underperforming that pace, and five States recording a contraction in gross GST receipts from a year ago.

Air quality turns 'poor' in 99 cities across India

Ninety-nine of the 265 cities for which Air Quality Index (AQI) data were available on the Central Pollution Control Board website reported "poor" air quality on Friday (data for 24 hours prior to 4 p.m. on this day). An AQI value of 200 or above corresponded to "poor" quality.

Thirteen cities, including Delhi, Gurugram, and Ghaziabad in the National Capital Territory Region, recorded "very poor" air quality - AQI of 300 or

Defying firecracker ban Ambala in Haryana recorded the highest AQI of 367 followed by Amritsar in Punjab (350), while Delhi's average AQI was 339.

These 24 hours corresponded to the period when Deepavali revellers took to burning crackers, defying a ban on it in places such as Delhi. People

Large cities such as Mumbai, Chennai, Bengaluru and Hyderabad registered a "moderate" AQI on Friday, but even among them, the AQI values had jumped from those registered on October 30. Data from 2023 corresponding to Deepavali celebrations show that Delhi's AQI was high at 358 on November 12, corresponding to a "very poor" air quality, jumping from 218 ("poor") the previous day.

Similar to this year, 53 and 85 cities had "very poor" and "poor" AQI respectively on November 12-13 as compared with eight and 42 cities the previous

Pollution during winter In cities such as Delhi and others in northern India, pollution levels peak during the winter season due to emissions from vehicles, industries, garbage burning, and construction work, besides stubble burning after the paddy season in neighbouring States, with particles being

trapped in the cold air. Unfavourable winds in the early winter months that don't flush the pollutants out also lead to a faster build-up. Firecracker burning has also contributed to exacerbating air qual-

ity during this period. Friday, Delhi's Anand Vihar station recorded its 10th highest concentration of PM2.5 this year (273.04 micrograms per cubic metre) if 24-hour values

Fire, police services attend 390 cracker-related distress calls on Deepavali day

The Telangana State Disaster Response and Fire Services received a total of 33 fire-cracker-related distress calls on Deepavali, including three major ones, said the officials from the fire control room.

One of the major mishaps was reported on Street Number 18 of Himayar Nagar, where a flat on the third floor was gutted. No major injuries were reported in any of the mishaps.

Officials said that they received 26 cracker-related calls in Hyderabad in the 24 hours till 12 a.m. on Deepavali. "We responded to 12 more calls after midnight," an official said.

Explaining the Himayat Nagar fire, officers said that the G+4 apartment was located in Street Number 18. The family left the flat with diyas still burning. Preliminary investigation suggests that clothing must have caught fire from there and the entire flat went up in flames, said an official.

Man rescued

Three fire tenders were rushed to the spot to put out the fire after a distress call was received at 10.34 p.m. Residents of the building spilled out upon noticing the smoke and flames. One person stuck on the same floor was rescued. He could not step out due to the heat from the fire, added the officer.

tained fire injuries on his hand and was rushed to hospital even before the fire tenders turned up. The mishap was a cracker-related incident and was reported on the first floor of a building, said the official.

Meanwhile, Eastwood Furniture in Saroornagar was gutted in flames on Deepavali night. The place was empty on the occasion of the festival.

Other mishaps were reported at an electrical shop in RP road, Secunderabad and a coconut tree caught fire in Domalguda.

Police attend 357 calls

The Hyderabad police responded to 357 dial 100 calls about noise pollution on Deepavali day on October 31.

DCP of (SMIT) K. Shilpavalli said that of the total 1,005 dial-100 calls, 357 were about noise pollution. "Of the 357, 25-30% were repeat ones," she explained.

As per the data shared by the police, the highest number of calls (68) were received from the West Zone of Hyderabad, which includes areas such as Banjara Hills, Jubilee Hills and Panjagutta. The least number of calls (31), were from the South Zone, which includes Charminar, Mirchowk, Chatrinaka and Falaknuma.

To curb noise pollution, Hyderabad City Police Commissioner C.V. Anand had issued a directive limiting the use of high-decibel crackers in public areas and on roads during Deepavali. As per the memo, crackers could only be burst between 8 p.m. and 10 p.m., and even then, had to adhere to Supreme Court noise level guidelines. The decision came in response to numerous noise pollution complaints received by the police's

100 helpline. The police categorised crackers into 'sound emitting' and 'sound and light emitting' types. While the former were banned in public spaces except during the specified hours, the latter could not exceed 55 decibels during daytime in residential areas.

Cracker injuries mar festivities for families in city

Deepavali, the festival of lights, turned somber for several Hyderabad residents this year, as government hospitals in the city reported cases of people suffering from firecracker injuries. The air in the emergen-

cy block of Sarojini Devi Eye Hospital was quiet but tense on Friday (November 1, 2024) morning. Rows of beds lined the Female Ophthalmic Ward (FOW). Though most were empty, three young patients were in the ward, each admitted within the last 12 hours. They were young children,

each with bandages over one or both eyes–a silent testament to a night of celebration turned into pain. Naresh sat beside one of

the beds, watching over his six-year-old daughter, Srinidhi, as she rested. Just hours earlier, their Diwali celebration at their home in Kismatpur was filled with the usual excitement of sparkles and laughter. But in a split second, the joy had turned to alarm.

"She was holding a sparkler. Most of it was burnt, but a piece broke off at the end and lodged in her left eye. She started crying immediately, and we rushed her here late in the night," Naresh recalled.

had attended to Srinidhi. "They ran some tests, and we're waiting for the results. If everything's clear, they'll discharge her by

evening," Naresh added. The Sarojini Devi Eye Hospital received 50 patients who suffered from firecracker injuries between Deepavali night and Friday morning. Among these, eight were admitted for further treatment. According to Superintendent of SD Eye Hospital Modini Pandharpurkar the admitted patients include five

adults and three children. While the adults sustained minor injuries, two children had foreign particles lodged in their corneas, necessitating minor surgical procedures. Dr. Modini reassured

that the admitted patients are in stable condition and expected to be discharged within the next two days. "Compared to last year, the number of cases is relatively low, but we anticipate a few more cases today and tomorrow, including possible referrals from nearby districts," she noted.

On October 31, the hospital recorded 213 outpatients, 100 inpatients, 16 new admissions, 62 discharges, and 35 emergency She further advised the

ochampally Komuraiah sits by his weathered kiln, the faint warmth from his Diwali diya sales already fading and his gaze fixed on an uncertain horizon. A potter from Bhupathipur village in Telangana's Peddapalli district, the 65-year-old's hands still shape clay with a skill honed across generations, yet his livelihood faces the threat of dwindling patronage. The number of potters in this village, once a bustling pottery hub, where 80 families used to thrive on their craft, has reduced to just two - Komuraiah is among the last, carrying the torch of tradition against the gusts of rapid urbanisation.

With his son having migrated to Dubai in search of greener pastures a few years ago, Komuraiah says he stands alone in sustaining his ancestors' craft. The Telangana government's upcoming statewide socio-economic survey from November 6 has given him a glimmer of hope, a potential boost for artisans like him who rely on pottery's quiet but essential presence in daily life from clay pots for weddings to ceremonial earthenware for village goddesses. "I make clay pots for toddy tappers too," he notes underlining the importance of pottery intertwined with other traditional occupations.

The survey's promise of government intervention is a small ray in the veteran potter's life. "We are pinning hopes on the upcoming kula ganana to ascertain the socio-economic status of rural artisans and government's policy interventions to give a fillip to traditional occupations," he says.

Weight of unfulfilled promises

The last intensive household survey – Samagra Kutumba survey – conducted on a single day in August 2014 by the previous Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) regime, had also stirred hope among artisans like Komuraiah, promising new support for traditional crafts and livelihood opportunities. Yet, for many, those promises never materialised. Some potters, disheartened, turned to farming or other trades.

"My son, who was working for a private company in Hyderabad then, had to hire a vehicle and rush to our village, along with his wife and children, to participate in that household survey," he recalls, adding, "We, however, did not receive any benefit from it."

Bakkaiah, another resident of Bhupathipur, hopes that the new survey will document the percentage of Backward Classes (BCs) in the population, paving the way for determining quotas in local body elections – a step that he believes could lead to much-needed economic and political empowerment for BCs.

"I toil in the palm grove every day to earn a livelihood by tapping toddy, enduring the risks of falling from Thati (palm) trees that are 30 to 40 feet high. My daily earnings are less than ₹250," says 48-year-old Burra Srinivas Goud from Irukulla village in Karimnagar rural mandal.

'There are around 500 palm trees in and around our village, but only about 25 members of our community depend on toddy tapping for their livelihood. My son distanced himself from the traditional occupation due to the grueling, risky task of climbing tall palm trees," he rues, adding he will apply for safety kits that the Telangana government is distributing under the 'Katamayya Rakshaka Kavacham' scheme.

"The upcoming caste survey should be conducted scientifically to gather accurate data for implementing real welfare measures that uplift weaker sections, including BCs," suggests Narayana, another villager.

In a wave of migration a decade ago, many flocked to their native villages in Telangana to take part in the State government's Intensive Household Survey (IHS) on August 19, 2014. Aimed at compiling socio-economic data for targeted welfare programmes, the survey required residents to be physically present at their native residences, creating challenges, especially for low-wage workers who had moved to urban centers like Hyderabad in search of employment.

Thousands undertook long, arduous journeys with essential documents like Aadhaar, ration, and voter ID cards in hand to ensure their inclusion. Among them was autorickshaw driver Ratlavath Dasru, who travelled from Karmanghat in Hyderabad to Cherukupalle in Nalgonda district, about 120 kilometres away. "We had to go back to our village with all necessary documents, as directed by the government, to ensure our inclusion in the records," he explains.

Cherukupalle, a village of 6,000, saw an influx of residents returning from places like Kalvakurthy, Nalgonda, and Hyderabad, many of whom had to leave work temporarily to avoid the risk of

For others, the fear of losing access to essential welfare benefits spurred even greater sacrifices. Uppula Ravindra Chary, who lives in Patancheru near Hyderabad, recounts making the trip to his native village, Nallabelli, in Warangal district with his family. "We rushed to our village as we feared that our names might be struck off ration cards or other essential records if we did not show up," he says, noting that many of his friends and acquaintances from Hyderabad and Warangal also returned to their respective hometowns.

M. Adinarayana Reddy experienced a similar urgency, returning to Nallabelli with his wife and two children, anxiously awaiting the enumerators at their ancestral home. "The government's intense publicity created a sense of urgency, and many feared future complications if their details weren't recorded. People waited at home, postponing other important work to ensure they didn't miss their turn," Reddy says.

He notes that one villager, Macherla Rajender, who works in Bhiwandi, Maharashtra, made the long journey back to Telangana to ensure his name remained in the records.

Jeevan Rao, another villager, shares that his nephew, a software engineer based in Bengaluru, had also travelled back for the survey.

The single-day survey, designated a public holiday under the Negotiable Instruments Act, presented severe logistical challenges. For those working far from their native villages, the requirement was especially demanding.

While some had family members to represent them, many migrants felt compelled to attend in person, fearing exclusion from welfare schemes. Despite promise of a thorough process, the rushed arrangement left many facing additional

financial burdens, from travel expenses to loss of

To gather accurate data from around 4 crore residents in just one day, the government mobilised nearly 4 lakh personnel, including Anganwadi workers and Accredited Social Health Activists, police, and other officials. They collected data on 94 items across eight broad categories, from Aadhaar and ration cards to caste certificates and vehicle registration details. Equipped with minimal training, the enumerators canvassed households, with each session lasting at least 15

While the then BRS government touted the survey as a landmark effort to streamline welfare programmes and prevent leakages, the compressed timeline drew criticism. Many noted that the frontline workers, under significant time pressure, began collecting much of the data a day or two earlier.

An engineering college faculty member, roped in as an enumerator, shares that he, along with 150 colleagues, covered numerous households each, without receiving any honorarium. "I had to ask my sister to provide my documents at our native village while I was out on duty," he says, underscoring the logistical hurdles involved.

According to official sources, the then Chief Minister K. Chandrasekhar Rao introduced sever-

al welfare schemes such as sheep distribution on subsiay, iree iisii seea distribution, and Bandhu, based on analysis of data collected through the 2014

survey. Although the government maintained that participation in the survey was voluntary, many travelled

from distant places, fearing that they would lose out on major welfare schemes.

A new approach

Now, the stage is set for the commencement of Telangana's first comprehensive socio-economic, educational, political, and caste census, from November 6. Over 80,000 enumerators, primarily teachers and 10,000 supervisors will survey every household across the State, creating a detailed database of all families. Data collection will take three weeks, followed by an additional three weeks for compiling explanatory notes, revisiting missing households, and distributing completed questionnaires with the signature of the head of the family. These records will then be stored at mandal headquarters for future reference.

Following the survey, there would be random household checks for two weeks to verify the authenticity of information. Altogether, the two phases, including data processing, are expected to take around eight weeks, based on a tentative schedule. This plan was prepared after reviewing similar survey processes and costs in Karnataka, Bihar, and Andhra Pradesh.

In Karnataka, for instance, the government spent ₹162 crore to survey 1.35 crore households over 50 days, gathering physical data. Andhra Pradesh conducted a similar survey over 15 days in a fully digital format, though exclusive expenditure was not listed. In Bihar, the General Administration department covered 2.77 crore households, with 15 days allocated for house listing and 30 days for enumeration, totaling a 45-day survey period. Telangana has allocated ₹150 crore for its comprehensive survey, anticipated to be completed within two months.

Aiming for accuracy, inclusivity

During the Budget session in July, Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy announced plans for a Statewide caste census and led the State Legislature to pass a resolution following a five-hour debate. The resolution committed to a comprehensive household survey across Telangana, encompassing socio-economic, educational, employment, political, and caste details to better address the needs of socially and educationally backward classes, SCs, and STs, as mandated by various constitutional provisions.

The move aligns with senior Congress leader Rahul Gandhi's call for a caste census as the basis for equitable policymaking, advocating for community representation based on population. Addressing a rally in Prayagraj, Uttar Pradesh, he stressed the need to revisit the 50% cap on reservations to ensure fair representation in government and education.

Inspired by Gandhi's stance, Chief Minister Reddy initiated steps after extensive consultations with officials, including the Backward Classes Commission. A detailed 50-point questionnaire has been prepared to collect data on each family's social, financial, and educational status, along with caste information, with a particular focus on enabling proportionate reservations for BCs in upcoming local body elections.

Analysts say a caste census has become essential, as population figures for BCs have been _ vague, often influenced by political calculations of respective ruling parties. While there is clarity over the SC and ST populations, the same is not true for BCs. This uncertainty complicates the equitable distribution of reservation benefits to

"There has not been a scientific study on the number of BCs for long. The census has become imperative due to increasing social aspirations of these groups over the years," says senior journal ist and analyst Telakapalli Ravi.

A social audit is now necessary to provide statistical support through a comprehensive database, which the government's planned survey aims to achieve. Senior officials say this survey is intended to assess the social backward indicators of the backward sections, allowing for a detailed examination of their challenges and the development of targeted policy interventions.

The Samagra Kutumba Survey conducted in 2014 mobilised the entire State apparatus to build a comprehensive household database to aid various government departments in efficiently targeting welfare programmes. Its aim was to ensure that the benefits of schemes reached the right recipients and minimised leakages implementation.

However, that survey excluded large sections of the population, such as those owning more than five acres of land, employees of State and Central governments, and PSUs, major business owners, income tax payers, outsourced staff, and those with homes having more than three rooms, thereby leaving significant gaps in the data.

Conducting the survey in a single day also drew criticism from officials, who argued that it was unfeasible. The five-page questionnaire required over 20 minutes per household, meaning that each official needed to work for around 18 hours non-stop to cover the 40-plus households assigned to them.

That impacted the credibility of the data, which remains unpublished, prompting some citizens to seek legal intervention to access it.

Learning from those challenges, the Congress government now is said to have taken steps to ensure that the current survey's schedule allows enough time for enumerators and supervisors to gather accurate details. The data collection will primarily be digital, with a printed questionnaire provided to each family.

This caste survey gains significance following the Supreme Court's recent approval to categorise SCs into A, B, C, and D groups. The government has formed a Cabinet sub-committee to to work out modalities for its implementation. The proposed caste census, primarily for preparing a scientific database of different caste groups and population of the sub castes within the community, has become crucial as the data will also be useful for SC categorisation, making the job easier for the government.

BC Commission chairman G. Niranjan and other members have already started touring districts to conduct open sessions with different caste groups. "We should have comprehensive database of the communities in the State. The High Court has also sought the same," Niranjan says.

The victims told him that three persons, Madhava Reddy, Chandrashekhar and Koteeswara Rao, showed them the permissions pertaining to Survey Number 6 and sold plots in Survey Number 12, which was government land. They were not informed about cancellation of permissions later.

Gig workers seeks fair fares, ban on unregistered taxis

Man accused of ₹7-crore fraud in Hyderabad arrested

In a breakthrough in the ₹7,000-crore DB Stock Broking scam, Vijji Jagadeesh Chandra Prasad. who worked as the manager of the Kukatpally branch of the company, was arrested by the Cyberabad Economic Offences Wing (EOW) on Friday for allegedly conning about a dozen investors from Hyderabad of ₹7 crore.

The inter-state trading fraud, allegedly orchestrated by the owner Deepankar Barman, was unearthed in Assam and found to have links in Hyderabad. Investigation in Hyderabad began following a complaint from 37year-old techie Shamai Panchakshar on September 23.

According to the police, Chandra Prasad offered his victims schemes with high interest returns such as 120% in a year and 54% in six months. After collecting significant amounts from investors, the company shut down operations in July 2024.

According to police, the accused offered his victims schemes with high returns such as 120% a year

₹1.45 crore in a real estate scam. Kancharla Satish Chandra Gupta, owner of Sai Surya Developers, was arrested by the Cyberabad EOW for selling plots in an unauthorised layout at Vattinagulapally village. The arrest follows a complaint lodged by a Nacharambased investor. Notably, this is not the first time Gupta has scammed people. He has 11 criminal cases against him for allegedly committing crimes with the same *modus operandi*.

According to the police, Gupta, along with managing director of M/s Bhagyanagar Properties Limited Narender Surana, fabricated an unauthorised layout under the names of 'Sai Tulasi Enclave-IV' and 'Shanmukha Nivas' on the same land in Vattinagulapally and made an Agreement for Sale for a plot at ₹3.25 crore. The duo then collected ₹1.45 crore as advance from the complainant and went incommuni-

32 students of tribal welfare school in Asifabad take ill

Thirty-two students of Tribal Welfare Ashram School in Asifabad fell ill allegedly after having contaminated water and food at a government hostel in Wankidi mandal on Thursday. The students complained of stomach ache, vomiting and diarrhoea after they had dinner on October 30. They were immediately taken to a Primary Health Centre (PHC) in the mandal headquarters, from where they were shifted to Asifabad Community Health Centre (CHC). Another batch of students complained of the same symptoms on October 31. One of them is in a critical state and is undergoing treatment in Mancherial, two are under observation at the Wankidi PHC and 29 others were discharged. Sources said that the issue could be triggered due to contaminated water. The borewell of the government school, run by the Tribal Welfare Department, is beside a drainage pipeline, the sources added.

21,000 enumerators across GHMC region for caste census

Principal Secretary of Municipal Administration Department M. Dana Kishore addressed enumerators and supervisors, who are taking part in the comprehensive survey for assessing socio-economic and caste status of the population, in Khairatabad zone on Friday, and asked them to ensure the survey is error-free. A total of 21,000 enumerators are being deployed across the GHMC region, with one supervisor for every 10 enumerators, Mr. Kishore said. He suggested that before carrying out the survey, the enumerators should be made to practice with photocopies of the survey forms. Zonal Commissioner Anurag Jayanti and Additional Commissioner K. Shivakumar Naidu took part in the training programme on Friday.

Diet, cosmetic charges for govt. hostel boarders raised by 40%

While current diet rate is ₹950 per boarder, per month, for students of Classes 3 to 7, the enhanced rate will be ₹1,330; for students of Classes 8 to 10 and Inter to PG level, increased diet charges will be ₹1,540, and ₹2,100, respectively

he State government passed orders on Thursday to enhance the diet and cosmetic charges by 40% for boarding students in welfare and residential hostels of SC/ST, BC and Minority, and other institutions run by the Telangana Residential Educational Institutions Society (TREIS).

While the current diet rate had been ₹950 per boarder, per month, for students of Classes 3 to 7, the enhanced rate will be ₹1,330 (i.e., ₹44.33 from the existing ₹31.66 per day), up by ₹380.

For students of Classes 8 to 10 and Intermediate to PG level, the increased diet charges will be ₹1,540, a hike of ₹1,100, and ₹2,100, of ₹1,500, raise respectively.

The new order, being referred to as the 'Chief Minister's Deepavali gift for hostellers', came into effect from Friday. The revi-

sion is aimed at benefiting 7,65,705 students.

The Chief Minister suggested to the authorities to make changes and additions in the diet so that students are served nutritious food. He said the new diet should be made available within 10 days.

According to officials,

the need for improvement in charges was studied by a committee led by Principal Secretary (Education) Burra Venkatesham.

The committee, while comparing different rates over the years, also examined the model being followed by Jawahar Navodaya Vidyalayas and as per the dietary guidelines prescribed by the National Institute of Nutrition.

Cosmetic charges, to ensure students follow personal hygiene and health, saw a hike of over three times the existing rate. For girls of Classes 3 to 7, the allowed charges had been ₹55 per boarder, per

month, and ₹75 for those from Classes 8 to 10. As per revised charges, it is going to be ₹175 and ₹275, respectively.

For boys of Classes 3 to 7 and 8 to 10, including hair cut charges, the existing rate was ₹62 per boarder, per month, and the revised rate is ₹150 and ₹200, respectively.

Cosmetic kits, usually provided every three months, contain a range toiletries apart from hair bands, ribbons and sanitary napkins for students.

Minister for Women and Child Welfare Seethakka, Congress MPs and Secretaries of the Education Department led by Mr. Venkatesham, called on Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy in Hyderabad on Friday to thank him for passing the much-awaited order.

The enhancement in diet and cosmetic charges will not only encourage and benefit students, but also improve the quality of education, they said.

Minister bats for model markets in every district

Minister for Agriculture Tummala Nageswara Rao has instructed the authorities of the Marketing Department to prepare proposals for developing a model market in every district on experimental basis, keeping in mind the present day needs.

KTR lauds Kharge's statement on guarantees

Meanwhile, Mr. Rama Rao criticised the government for procuring paddy, produced in the Kharif season, at a snail's pace; against the target of purchasing 8.16 lakh tonnes of the major crop in October, only 7,629 tonnes were procured from 913 farmers till October 28.

Besides, the slow procurement of grain was not enough, and farmers had to suffer more loss as untimely rains soaked paddy stocks, he said.

Existing shapes, poses studied to finalise Bapu Ghat statue

Bapu Ghat, on the banks of Musi River, will have the tallest statue of Mahatma Gandhi in the world, overtaking the present one in Patna, but the government is still toying with the shape of the statue.

Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy has asked officials to study various sizes and shapes of Gandhi's statues in India, as well as abroad, so that the best design could be adopted.

As of now, among all his statues in the country, the one at Gandhi Maidan in Patna is the tallest with 72 foot. Made of bronze, it was inaugurated in 2013.

as it is at the confluence of the Musi and Isa, coming from Osmansagar and Himayatsagar. Apart from the statue, the government also plans to develop it as an education hub of Gandhian philosophy, where courses in communication, ethics and values will be taken up.

The State-wide household survey (Socio, Economic, Educational, Employment, Political and Caste Survey) involving around 90,000 enumerators is slated to begin on November 6. It will determine the socioeconomic and caste details of the entire population in the State, Commission for Backward Classes Chairman G. Niranjan said.

The BC Commission held a public hearing at the Collectorate in Karimnagar on Friday. soon after the public hearing, Mr. Niranjan called upon people to participate in the household survey without fail and make it a success. The survey determines the future of people and everyone should become active partners in it, he emphasised.

Opposition parties should refrain spreading misconceptions about the household survey and cooperate with the whole exercise, he said.

He added that the heartwrenching ordeals of some unknown castes had come to their notice during the public hearings. The views and suggestions received from the participants during the public hearings will be compiled and a detailed report, based on facts, will be submitted to the government.

Kodakara case: LDF seeks to exploit allegation against BJP

Ex-BJP leader alleges that 'black money' stolen from Kerala was for party's campaign for Assembly polls in 2021; CM asks police to explore reinvestigation option; 22 persons were held in the case

he Left Democratic Front (LDF) government on Friday raced to politically exploit the damning "disclosure" by an expelled Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) leader that the ₹6 crore of "black money" stolen from a car at Kodakara in Thrissur district in the run-up to the 2021 Assembly election was part of a significant tranche of secret electioneering funds for the BIP.

Meanwhile, the Communist Party of India (Marxist) State secretariat has decided to make the Kodakara hawala case a key issue in the byelection in Kerala. It has also called for a reinvestigation into the

On Thursday, a former office secretary of the BJP in Thrissur, Tirur Satheesh, stirred the pot by alleging that the "black money" from Karnataka was meant for the BJP's electioneering purposes.

He said he had safeguarded the cash bags at the BJP's Thrissur office, allegedly in the presence of party State president K. Surendran. Days later, in a mafia-style ambush operation, anonymous persons stole the cash as it was being transported on a car.

The Kerala police arrested 22 persons in connection with the heist, but reportedly found scarce evidence to link the money to the BJP leadership con-

Participants expressed concern over the allegations made by the United Democratic Front (UDF) claiming a deal between the BJP and the CPI(M) and stressed the need for urgent action to counter such

The CPI(M) noted that the revelations made by Mr. Satheesh were serious and decided to check the legal scope for a reinvestigation.

Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan has asked the police to explore the legal options for a reinvestigation. The government and Opposition have accused the Opposition of attempting to cover up the case.

In the Kodakara scam, accusations had earlier been raised about a potential cover-up bid by the government.

The police had previously indicated that investigation had not yielded testimonies linking key BJP leaders with the case. However, with the recent revelations by Mr. Satheesh, crucial evidence had now emerged.

The meeting assessed that if the government decided to proceed with a reinvestigation, it could benefit the CPI(M) politically.

The controversial "expose" by the former office secretary of the BJP in Thrissur, Tirur Satheesh, triggered a demand for a comprehensive re-investigation by the Opposition.

Opposition charge

The disclosure prompted Leader of the Opposition V.D. Satheesan to cite the police's clean chit to the BIP as another telling example of the CPI(M)'s collusion with the Sangh Parivar-led Union government to save the outwardly opposing parties from discomfiting criminal investigations by the State and Central law enforcement agencies.

Mr. Surendran termed the controversy a shortlived by election propaganda by the Congress and the CPI(M) to disadvantage the BIP.



Nine years ago, she got married to Sudhakar of Pocharam in Peddavangara mandal of Mahabubabad. The couple were blessed with a daughter Arohi, 9, and Ishan. "He started harassing me soon after marriage. I bore with him hoping he would change," she recalls.

Nine months ago, Sudhakar filed a divorce petition in Mahabubabad local court. On September 25, she went there along with her son and mother.

After the court hearing, they started for Hyderabad in a RTC bus. Sudhakar too

Her mother Karuna boarded the bus

"When I got off to attend nature's call at Thorrur, mv husband forcibly took away the boy from my mother," Sindhuja charges.

Plea to judge

After waiting till night at the bus stand hoping her husband to return, the woman went to the court the next day and explained to the local court Judge about her son's 'abduction'.

The Judge summoned a police constable available at the court and directed him to help the woman approach the local police. "From that day, I had been pleading with Mahabubabad police to trace my son by going there every alternate day from Hyderabad," she alleges. For reasons best known to them, the police did not register any case till the woman met the DSP N. Thirupathi Rao on October 25 seeking justice. At the instance of the DSP, the police registered a kidnap case. "Though I had been providing them leads about my husband's movements, they did not bother to take action," the woman alleges. Asked why the case was not registered even after the local Judge alerted them, the DSP said: "When Inspector Devender spoke with Sudhakar, the latter assured to return the boy." "We are making efforts to rescue the child," Mr. Rao said.

Core correction

Infrastructure sectors' ebbing output triggers capex growth concerns

eavy August rains dampened industrial activity, resulting in the first contraction in India's factory output since October 2022. The signals for a significant September resurgence do not appear very promising, with the late withdrawal of the southwest monsoon also skewing some activity such as power demand. Output from India's eight core sectors declined 0.8% in September relative to August, and was an insipid 2% higher than last September. These infrastructure sectors constitute about 40% of industrial production, and had contracted for the first time in 42 months in August – the Ministry has revised the de-growth level to 1.6% from 1.8% estimated initially. These sectors have now grown just 4.2% in the first half of 2024-25, almost halving from 8.2% in the first half of last year, and significantly under the 2023-24 growth pace of 7.6%. While year-on-year growth numbers may swing due to base effects, of concern is a consistent decline in the Index of Core Industries (basically the absolute production levels) since May. In September, the index slipped for the fourth successive month – 8% below May's value. Overall industrial output, economists reckon, may come out of the August trough in September but with a weak growth print at best.

This slowdown in industrial activity is worrisome amid anxiety about weakening urban consumption of durables such as cars as well as daily use items, reflected in weak second quarter results of fast-moving consumer goods firms. Though rural demand is seen to be improving after a healthier monsoon, tremors in urban spends will pull the domestic consumption engine of India's growth to sub-optimal levels. Government accounts show that capital spending on public infrastructure projects by the Centre has shrunk 15% this year - although capex spiked in July after the 2024 general election dented the first quarter numbers, the pace receded in August and September. This may explain some of the weak output trends for core sectors such as steel that hinge on construction activity. Poor vehicle sales and cheaper imports may have also weighed in to drag steel output growth to a 33month low of 1.5% in September, with output at its lowest since December 2023. There may be a tentative recovery afoot in private investments, but public infra spends that have spearheaded growth in recent years need to lead the way. The Centre's ₹11.11 lakh crore capex goal for the year acknowledges this, and it must now ramp up these spends to get closer to, if not entirely meet, that target. This would be critical to keep growth ticking along and push back concerns about India entering a cyclical slowdown.

Safe worship

Safety regulations must be enforced strictly in places of worship

he explosion of firecrackers during ple festival ritual in Kasaragod district of Kerala, which left over 150 people injured, could have been averted with greater caution and an adherence to safety regulations. That such an accident took place in a State where similar events have occurred at regular intervals in the last 40 years tells a story of unlearnt lessons. In February this year, a blast in a firecracker storage unit, during a temple fete in Kochi, claimed two lives and left 25 injured. Eight years ago, the Kerala High Court made the observation of an "unhealthy culture" glamourising every religious festival and ceremony with the use of fireworks and an elephant parade. The only saving grace in the accident on October 29, at the Anjootambalam Veererkavu temple in Neeleswaram, was that there was no loss of life. Some arrests have been made, two inquiries ordered and a special team is probing the accident. The State Human Rights Commission has initiated an investigation and

sought an official report in 15 days. In the given instance, two of the arrested persons allegedly ignited the firecrackers, with one of them said to have ignored the warnings of onlookers. The crackers were close to a shed where explosives were stored. In 2016, in the worst pyrotechnics tragedy in the State, 100 people died during a festival at the Puttingal Devi temple in Kollam district. It resulted in the High Court and the Union government issuing a number of directives. Days after the Centre amended the rules of the Explosives Act, the Revenue Minister of Kerala, K. Rajan said these posed an "open challenge" to the conduct of the Thrissur Pooram. On October 23, a Kerala Cabinet meeting expressed the view that the amendments would make it impossible to have the display of fireworks, a permanent fixture in religious festivals in the State, and that this should be conveyed to the Central government. The amendments, that were notified on October 11, included having a 200-metre distance between the site of the fireworks and the place of storage, and people watching from 100 m afar. Six months ago, there were protests when the authorities permitted fireworks, as part of the Thrissur Pooram, but only during the day. Even in 2016, an all-party meeting that was held following the Puttingal Devi temple accident, did not favour a complete ban on fireworks. This was the stand of the High Court too, in March 2024, while quashing an official order against the use of fireworks in a few temple festivals. In such a complex situation, there is no option but to strictly enforce safety norms. Even so, there are some who still argue that "cultural practices" should be balanced against safety norms. But clearly, no activity that endangers the safety of devotees can be allowed in any place of public worship.

The Nilgiris as a shared wilderness

xactly 20 years ago, in the summer of 2004, I fell in love again. First with a tree, then with a mountain, and, eventually, with a whole biosphere. On an exploratory journey in Coonoor, Tamil Nadu, my husband and I landed up in a beautiful colonial bungalow with an enormous blue gum eucalyptus at the entrance. Until that moment, I had thought of the species as foreign, as invasive, as water greedy. All its negative labels disappeared as I gazed in astonishment at the girth of this giant, its ghostly branches, and its perfectly balanced canopy. Soon, we had a second home in the Nilgiris, and a new commitment to the conservation of this remarkable ecozone.

The Nilgiri biosphere is the first UNESCO-declared biosphere in the country, covering over 5,500 square kilometres across the three States of Karnataka, Kerala and Tamil Nadu. From the iconic Doddabetta, rising 2,637 metres into the sky, to the 260-m depth of the Moyar gorge, it encompasses a rich biodiversity. It has endemic flora and fauna seen nowhere else in the world, such as the medicinal Baeolepis nervosa plant used by the Irula tribe, the Nilgiri Chilappan, and the star-eyed bush frog.

More human activity, new challenges

Of late, this biosphere has seen more human activity than ever before. Known primarily for its colonial-era tea plantations, it now boasts a thriving agriculture and tourism economy. While both sectors bring in much needed livelihoods, they have also brought in new challenges.

The tourism is less sustainable than local communities and the State would like, with day-trippers adding to the waste and the traffic snarls. Farmers increasingly use heavy pesticides and fertilizers, which contaminate once pristine water sources.

In the face of such rapid change, local communities have galvanised themselves to protect their home. Many civil society organisations in the district have innovated for sustainability, such as 'Clean Coonoor', a public-private partnership that creates a circular economy for growing solid waste. And the Keystone Foundation, which empowers indigenous and local communities for climate

The State government and the district administration too have advanced aspirations for the Nilgiris, including the three hill stations of Ooty, Coonoor and Kotagiri, which attract visitors from across the country.

They plan to go carbon neutral, stop plastic waste, conserve endemic species such as the Nilgiri tahr that roam the high shola grasslands and reduce invasives such as Lantana camara and pine to restore native shola species in the valleys. Alongside, there is an increasing interest in the



Conservation success, helping the state

A measure of the success of conservation efforts is in the numbers of wild animals that thrive in the Nilgiri Biosphere, the largest protected forest expanse in the country with safeguarded areas including Mudumalai and Mukurthi.

Increasing wildlife numbers have led to wide dispersal outside protected areas. Wildlife is everywhere now, in new ecological niches created by global warming. Plants and animals have successfully adapted to living almost incognito among us. The best example is that of the elusive leopard, which has developed quite an appetite for domestic dogs.

You can find the Indian gaur in the tea plantations, wild pigs in the garbage dumps, and sloth bears and leopards prowling around bungalows at night. Last year, a rather clever sloth bear broke into our home, wandered around the house, and, no doubt, disappointed by the lack of food, left the house by jumping from the first-floor balcony. We were away, but our CCTV cameras recorded the entire adventure.

Neighbours have had wild encounters too, with porcupines and mouse deer, elephants and leopards. Surprisingly, people seem to have adjusted to this development, though human-wildlife conflicts hit the news ever so

This is part of an emergent global culture where billions of people are becoming nature lovers. They are rediscovering wonder. Citizen science has become a movement. Thanks to democratising technologies, people can share the beauty around them with one click; they can raise issues of concern, about shrinking habitats and human-animal conflict.

Clear evidence has emerged through the work of non-governmental organisations such as the Nature Conservation Foundation and WWF, that simple, yet powerful, technologies, which include early warning systems through mobile phone-based alerts, cameras and GPS tracking of animals, have helped reduce dangerous wildlife encounters.

When animals are so widely loved and so closely tracked, poaching becomes much riskier. Poaching thrives in secrecy, away from the public gaze. When tourists and wildlife enthusiasts wish to immerse themselves in wilderness, there is economic incentive locally to ensure that nature

If we want to continue to conserve this unique biosphere, it must be with the help of society, of

the samaaj. We have to align also with the bazaar – represented by plantations, farmers, traders and the tourism industry. The state, including the Forest Department, cannot be the sole steward of

It is impossible for sarkaar to take whole and sole accountability, even if the Wildlife (Protection) Act 1972/The Wildlife (Protection) Amendment Act, 2022 says all wild animals belong to the state. The perception that animals are the government's responsibility creates a great disaffection in the public mind. Farmers get angry with the forester. Plantation owners become wary. "If these are your animals, you keep them. Why are they eating my crops, or injuring our workers?"

Yet, hard boundaries, fences and walls are neither feasible nor desirable to keep animals inside the forests.

Instead, what if we assumed that we are all in this together? What if we created a trust network of everyone interested in the conservation of our biodiversity? What if we took advantage of all emerging technologies such as sensitive cameras, satellite imagery, sensors and artificial intelligence, both within and outside of protected areas? What if all citizens of our country were engaged in the regeneration of our natural wealth?

The pivotal role of storytelling

As I have discovered in my 40-year ecological journey, to conserve nature, we first must learn to love. To love, we have to sense. It is not a mere intellectual exercise. If we see the beauty and the frailty of the wild, its flora and fauna – from the tiniest ant to the mightiest elephant, our wonder is ignited. We want to protect, to nurture and be

Not everyone can visit every area of wilderness they wish to explore.

Storytelling by the few who can is critical to the process of creating communities for conservation. Our ancestors in the Nilgiris knew this well. In Sigur and Vellerikombai, the rock art created thousands of years ago still celebrates the relationship between humans and animals.

Charcoal and chalk have been replaced by cameras and pixels, but the urge remains the same. To share, to connect, to preserve.

Tomorrow, November 3, is International Day for Biosphere Reserves. In a first such documentary, we at Rohini Nilekani Philanthropies, together with Felis Films, are proud to present The Nilgiris - A Shared Wilderness. We have dedicated this film to the communities of the Nilgiris and to Forest Departments across the biosphere.

We hope it will spark more curiosity, evoke more affection and spur more action across samaaj, sarkaar and bazaar for the continued protection of the precarious and precious Nilgiris.

Zeroing in on methane diplomacy, at COP29

rom November 11 to 22, 2024, world eaders will gather in Baku, Azerbaijan, for the 29th Conference of Parties (COP29) to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC). Dubbed the "Finance COP", representatives from every country will, for the first time in 15 years, set a new global climate finance goal, known as the "new collective quantified goal" or NCQG. The host country, Azerbaijan, has put forward an action agenda, which includes pledges to increase battery storage capacity six-fold, dramatically expand electricity networks, and cut methane emissions from organic waste.

Methane's climate impacts are severe, accounting for around 30% of global warming since the pre-industrial era, and its atmospheric concentration is rising rapidly. Crucially, on a 100-year timescale, methane has 28 times greater global warming potential than carbon dioxide and is 84 times more potent on a 20-year

This means that cutting methane is one of the most effective levers we have to slow near-term temperature rise and buy time for the longer-term CO2 reductions needed to stabilise climate change.

Common ground between U.S., China Despite tensions in their relationship, the United States and China have found common ground in addressing non-CO₂ greenhouse gases such as methane. The two countries joined hands with the United Arab Emirates at COP28 (in Dubai, in November-December 2023) to sponsor a summit

on methane and other non-CO₂ emissions. That month, in November 2023, China also released its first national plan for controlling methane emissions. While the plan eschewed specific mitigation targets in favour of capacity building, it signalled China's acceptance of methane as an area for action and cooperation with the U.S.

India, the world's third-largest source of anthropogenic methane emissions behind China and the U.S., has an opportunity to leverage the U.S.-China methane partnership to gain

According to the India Third Biennial Update Report to the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, the country emitted 409 million tons of CO₂-equivalent methane in 2016 (excluding land use and forestry), with agriculture accounting for 74%, waste for 14%, energy for 11%, and industrial processes for 1%. Methane's detrimental effects go beyond its impact on climate change. Fires at waste dumpsites, for example, can cause significant spikes in air pollution. In 2022, a two-week fire at Delhi's Bhalswa dumpsite led to particulate matter concentrations reaching 30% to 70% above baseline levels at nearby air quality monitoring stations.

But the dominance of agriculture, particularly livestock and rice cultivation, is what makes India hesitant to announce economy-wide methane reduction targets or sign the Global Methane Pledge championed by the U.S. and the European Union at COP28, which seeks to cut emissions by 30% from 2020 levels by 2030. However, the U.S.-China focus on methane creates an opening for India to seek targeted assistance for reducing emissions from specific sectors such as waste management.

Waste management programmes

The Indian government has developed a strong regulatory framework for waste management, but weak local capacity hampers implementation. However, it is working to expand innovative solutions across the country. A notable example is the model pioneered in Indore, Madhya Pradesh, which pairs citywide organic waste sorting with a large biomethane plant that produces fuel for buses. The government is also promoting the Galvanizing Organic Bio-Agro Resources Dhan (GOBARdhan) scheme, which incentivises cattle waste utilisation and clean energy production in villages. These initiatives are part of the broader Swachh Bharat Mission-Urban 2.0 programme to improve solid waste management. However, cities need more support to scale up organic waste management to its full potential. In the agriculture sector, the practices through the National Mission for Sustainable Agriculture (NMSA). These include methane reduction techniques in rice cultivation, which can contribute to substantial emissions reductions. The National Livestock Mission also promotes practices such as green fodder production, silage making, chaff cutting, and total mixed ration to reduce methane emissions from livestock.

An opportunity in the U.S.'s plan

This is where COP29 and India's methane diplomacy come in. The U.S.-China methane partnership, while limited compared to their past cooperation, still creates an opening for India to seek concrete assistance for its methane mitigation efforts. In particular, India can leverage the U.S. methane push to gain financing and capacity-building support for reducing emissions from its waste sector, which produces over 14% of its methane. India's 2016 inventory estimates these sources as producing around 4% of India's methane emissions. But underlying data quality (emissions factors as well as waste stream volumes) is poor. Satellite monitoring on Delhi and Mumbai, for instance, suggests that emissions levels are 50%-100% above commonly used estimates and that dumpsites alone account for more than a quarter of Mumbai's greenhouse

Methane may be a side issue in the overall COP29 agenda, but it presents a significant opportunity for India to fast-track its efforts in reducing methane emissions. The Government of India has laid the groundwork with its existing policies and initiatives.

However, to effectively scale up the implementation of proven technological solutions worldwide, India now requires targeted international support in financing, capacity building, and technical assistance. By leveraging the U.S.-China methane partnership and proactively seeking this support at COP29, India can tap into the resources needed to accelerate its progress in methane abatement.


Focus on air pollution The appeals to use less fireworks during Deepavali

The Maharashtra government rolled out the Majhi Ladki Bahin Yojana in August 2024 and is counting on it to gather votes from women. Ever since the scheme was introduced and beneficiaries began thronging banks, + there have been several attacks on public sector bank employees. **Vinaya Deshpande Pandit** reports on a scheme that has caused law and order problems and created fear among employees

> shish Singh cannot twitch his nose. It is fractured, swollen, and, worse, a constant reminder of the day when he was attacked at his workplace.

A few weeks ago, Singh, the branch manager f a public sector bank in Maharashtra, was at work when a woman and her family members walked in. They stood in queue, waiting to link their Aadhaar with their account, which is mandatory for beneficiaries of the Majhi Ladki Bahin Yojana, a government scheme. When Singh requested them not to let the children jump with their sandals on the sofa meant for senior citizens, one of the women got angry, he recalls. "She hit me with a high-heeled sandal," he says. The entire family then proceeded to assault Singh. The office staff rushed to get police help.

The incident was captured on the bank's CCTV camera. Singh flicks out his phone and shows a 10-second clip of the footage. He has deleted the rest because it is "too traumatic".

Soon after the incident, Singh was transferred abruptly and is now the manager of another branch of the bank, located within a 100-kilometre radius. He is aggrieved – he was supposed to be the bank manager for three years but was shunted out in just three months.

"I was not even asked if I wanted to move out. Those who helped protect me were also transferred. What was our fault? That we stood against those who attacked us and filed an FIR (first information report) against them?" he asks. "I feel like I am guilty even though I am the victim here."

Growing attacks

The attacks on bank employees began soon after the Maharashtra government rolled out the Mukhyamantri Majhi Ladki Bahin Yojana, one of its flagship schemes, in August 2024. Under this, the government provides a monthly financial benefit of ₹1,500 to women through direct benefit transfers. Women between 21 and 65 years, who are permanent residents of the State, and have an annual family income of less than ₹2.5 lakh are eligible. The number of beneficiaries is 2.34 crore.

The government had said "financial assistance under the Majhi Ladki Bahin Yojana 2024 will be transferred directly to the selected applicant's bank account." Days after the scheme was introduced, public sector banks across the State started disbursing the amount to beneficiaries.

Maharashtra's current Mahayuti government that consists of the Bharatiya Janata Party, the Eknath Shinde-led Shiv Sena, and the Ajit Pawar-led Nationalist Congress Party is banking on the scheme to come back to power, following the Assembly elections this month. However, there are issues in implementation. Employees of public sector banks, who are an instrumental part of making the scheme successful, have been getting attacked and assaulted across the State by customers, borrowers, the public, and political elements. Fourteen FIRs have been filed across the State since August, but bank unions say that the

number of assaults is actually three times higher. "Several fights have taken place over the counter," says a union representative. A high-level meeting at the Secretariat was held on October 29 on the problem, but the attacks continue.

The video of a young man using foul langua and trying to charge at a branch manager in Dombivli went viral. In Jalna, a local leader of the youth wing of the Swabhimani Shetkari Sanghatana, a farmers' union, allegedly assaulted a branch manager at Varud Budruk in Jafarabad taluka over a delay in payment of grants to farmers and women. Again, the video went viral on social media. "We taught him a lesson in 'Swabhimani style'," local party workers told the media later.

Many bank employees say the police have failed to invoke Section 121 (causing grievous injuries to deter a public servant from their duty) of the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita in several FIRs. Instead, the police have filed watered-down FIRs, which makes it easy for the accused to get immediate bail, claim the employees.

While the government has been trying to placate the bank employees, who are worried for their safety, many aspiring political leaders have also been at the forefront of these assaults, to gain quick public support, and have been livestreaming their attacks on their social media accounts. Many bank employees claim police apathy. Notices have been put up in banks, warning people of strict legal consequences if they attack bank employees. But the malady is deeper,


according to experts.

Mounting service charges

One of the main conditions of the scheme is that the bank account has to be linked to the beneficiary's Aadhaar card. While several women had opened bank accounts, especially during the launch of the Jan Dhan Yojana, a financial inclusion programme of the Government of India launched in 2014, several accounts were dormant or were without KYC documents, explains Devidas Tuljapurkar, General Secretary of Maharashtra State Bank Employees' Association. (KYC or 'know your customer' is a mandatory process to verify customer identity and prevent fraudulent activities.) "When these women went to banks in the hope of getting ₹1,500, they were asked to update their KYC details or link their accounts with their Aadhaar. Some of them say they lost some money due to the automatic charges levied on

In Loni Kalbhor, a village about 11 km east of ₹92,000 penalty had been imposed on her account. She had been running a small business. The account became dormant from 2020 after she went bankrupt. Lonkar learned that approximately twice each month, ACH (Automated Clearing House) return charges of ₹354 had been imposed on her account. (ACH transactions are electronic money transfers between financial institutions that are often used for payroll, bills, taxes, and other financial activities.) In addition, other charges were levied. When the government transferred money under the Ladki Bahin Yoja-

There are service charges for all bank services, including closure of an account. When such charges are automatically debited, bank emplovees cannot reverse them. When hundreds of beneficiaries throng the banks at the same time to claim benefits under schemes such as this, the responsibility of breaking this news falls on the branch employee. The employees fall in the line of fire. Interviews with bank employees and account holders reveal how people are desperate for the money, and feel that they have been cheated. According to bank employees' unions, during the election season, the government is keen to show that it has disbursed the money.



the dormant accounts," he says.

Pune in western Maharashtra, Saguna Lonkar was aghast when she went to the bank to claim benefits under the scheme and found that a na, the penalty finally stood at ₹89,503.

Banks are short-staffed and cannot deal with the serpentine queues. As patience wears out and service provision takes time, employees are sometimes assaulted.

The problems in banks

Tuljapurkar says this is "commodification of poverty and helplessness". He says the poor are vulnerable and want to take whatever help the state offers. During election time, the political leaders take advantage of this helplessness. "This is election season. Why are bank employees being attacked now? It didn't happen earlier. Today, bank employees are well-off. They are paid better than before. The people who come to public sector banks are often poor. There is a financial gap between them. The poor believe that banks don't fulfil their demands. In fact, they believe that they are the ones that create impediments. So, there is anger against the system," he argues.

Tuljapurkar says this is a larger systemic issue that needs to be addressed. "It is cruel that the banks don't employ security guards for the safety of their own branch staff. If the government does not provide protection, the bank management should. In a recent meeting, the State government told the SLBC (State Level Bankers' Committee) that it disburses ₹8,000 crore through these banks and that the banks should spend on security," he adds.

Vitthal Mane, convenor of United Forum of Bank Unions, says public sector banks are understaffed, which is why employees are being attacked. "Though processes are digitised, the people who come from rural areas or who are poor approach banks. Policymakers think that since banking is digitised, staff members are not needed. That is not true. We need more tech-savvy staff to help those approaching banks. That is why we had organised a dharna in Mumbai. We made three demands: there should be new recruitment; safety must be ensured; and strict action must be taken against the culprits."

The Hindu repeatedly contacted the SLBC representative, Satish Kumar, but he did not answer our detailed queries. However, an official who is not authorised to speak to the media admits that the issue is of serious concern. "This is a big issue and banks have been taking cognisance of it," the official says.

The minutes of the meeting held at the Maharashtra State Secretariat on October 29 with the subject line, 'Details of the meeting held for the bank transactions related to Mukhyamantri Majhi Ladki Bahin Yojana, chaired by Honourable Secretary of Women and Child Development department on 29/10/2024 at 3 pm', reads: "For the implementation of Mukhyamantri Majhi Ladki Bahin Yojana, there is a massive crowd in the banks for opening bank accounts of the beneficiary women, linking the bank accounts with Aadhaar, doing KYC, the demand that the installment should not be adjusted against pending service charges or loan installments."

The minutes of the meeting say that according to the Convenor of United Forum of Banks Union, "inappropriate incidents" were taking place against the bank employees "during this rush." The note emphasises the need for adequate security measures and seeks Standard Operating Procedures from the banks that ensure the deducted banking service charges are refunded. It seeks more coordination of the police, the administration, and the banks for better security.

The government acknowledges that there is an issue and has said that a remedial plan should be in place. But there is no clarity yet on whether the banks will appoint private security guards or whether they expect the State machinery to provide security to the branches.

As of now, the addition of new members to the Mukhyamantri Majhi Ladki Bahin Yojana has stopped due to the Model Code of Conduct, which is in place as Maharashtra goes to the polls on November 20. Public sector bank employees are busy with election duty and bank responsibilities and say they live in the hope that they won't be attacked any more.

Political issue

Meanwhile, the Opposition has slammed the government over the lack of financial planning while rolling out the scheme. "The previous Uddhav Thackeray government had rolled out a loan waiver of ₹36,000 crore for the farmers of Maharashtra. How did that not lead to any strain on the bank employees?" says Shiv Sena (Uddhav Balasaheb Thackeray) MP Sanjay Raut. "Whether it was the note-ban decision or the Mukhyamantri Majhi Ladki Bahin Yojana, they have been brought about without any financial planning and only for electoral benefits. When we come to power, we will fit it in the legal and financial framework."

Even as the government tries to stop the attacks, employees are worried. The police acted swiftly to register a case against Pandurang Devkar, a bank employee, but he still fears for his life. "I was followed, abducted, and taken to a crematorium. I was beaten black and blue with rods and sharp weapons," Devkar says.

"Whenever the government wants to bring about such populist schemes, they should take the banks and financial institutions into confidence. They should let us know about their plans, take feedback from us, and then introduce these schemes. That way, there will be better coordination and less stress on banking structures," he adds.

GST receipts' growth picks up, but off target

On a year-on-year basis, revenues were flat in Uttarakhand, while they shrank a sharp 33% in Arunachal Pradesh, 8% in Nagaland, and 5% in Manipur, which was a moderate improvement from the 33% shrinkage in the strife-torn State's GST revenues during September. Himachal Pradesh and Chhattisgarh clocked a contraction of 2% and 1%, respectively, in October.

Kerala, by contrast, recorded the highest growth at 20%, followed by Gujarat, whose revenues grew 17% after staying flat in September. Four States' revenues rose 15%, including Haryana and West Bengal, while Maharashtra and Bihar reported a 14% growth in GST receipts.

Among the States that witnessed weaker revenue growth, the poorest performance came from the erstwhile State of Jammu and Kashmir as well as Sikkim, with just 2% growth, followed by a 3% rise in Jharkhand, and just 4% in Tamil Nadu.

"While many large States have recorded an increase above 9%, some of them and many of the smaller States have shown a below average increase, which would be an area of concern for them," said M.S. Mani, partner at Deloitte India.

Jump in refunds

Refunds to domestic taxpayers jumped 42.8% in October, from about 24% in September, improving for the third straight month. However, exportrelated refunds of GST collections contracted 2% in October, compared to a 39.2% spike in the preceding month.

Overall refunds were 18.2% higher than last October, slowing for the second successive month. Mr. Mani, however, felt that the refund levels were healthy and indicate stabilisation of the refund process and reduction in rejections due to interpretative issues. In July, refunds had contracted by over 19%.

Winds help Delhi escape 'severe' air pollution after Deepavali

With city residents openly flouting the ban on firecrackers, Delhi's 24-hour average air quality index turned 'very poor' on Friday, but experts say it could have been worse had it not been for the winds that blew across the capital at night

ir pollution in the national capital on morning was 14 times higher than the permissible limit prescribed by the World Organisation Health (WHO), according to the official data.

With city residents openly flouting the ban on firecrackers notified by the Delhi government on October 21, Delhi's overall 24hour average air quality index (AQI) settled at 339 ('very poor'), up from 328 ('poor') a day earlier, as per the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB)'s official bulletin. A higher value of AQI suggests an increase in air pollution.

However, experts said the AQI had spiked even higher on the night of Deepavali but was mitigated by winds that blew across the Capital through the night.

Ahead of Deepavali, official forecasts showed that Delhi's AQI could deterio-

rate to the 'severe' category on Friday due to firecrackers.

"The air pollution peaked around 2 a.m. on November 1 due to firecrackers. But the wind speed had picked up from October 31 evening itself and flushed out the pollutants," said Sachin Ghude, a scientist at the Indian Institute of Tropical Meteorology, Pune.

The overall level of PM2.5 (a chief pollutant) in Delhi was found to be 209.1 micrograms per cubic meter at 8 a.m. on Friday, as per CPCB data, which is 14 times the WHO's permissible limit of 15 micrograms per cubic meter.

However, in some parts of the city, the level of PM2.5 was over 100-120

times the WHO limit, but it improved over time, according to Delhi Pollution Control Committee (DPCC)

According to the Central government's Air Quality Early Warning System for Delhi, the city's air quality is likely to be in the 'very poor' category Friday night onwards as meteorological conditions are likely to be "extremely unfavourable".

Meanwhile, the contribution of stubble burning in neighbouring states to PM2.5 in Delhi on Thursday was 27.6%, the highest proportion recorded this paddy harvest season, according to the Union Ministry of Earth Sciences data.

Air pollution spikes in Delhi and many other parts of north India every winter.

Political slugfest The better-than-expected

air quality on Friday morning led to a war of words between the ruling Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) and the BJP. Delhi Environment Minister Gopal Rai credited the people for bursting "fewer" firecrackers this Deepavali and thanked them. He said those who burst firecrackers this year "will be convinced to light divas" the next Deepavali. He said the government has increased water sprinkling across the Capital to control bad air.

2 non-locals injured after being shot at in Kashmir

Suspected militants fired upon and injured two nonlocals in the Mazhama Magam area of Budgam in Kashmir on evening.

Sanjay and Usman, both from Uttar Pradesh, were working on a project of the Jal Jeevan Department on the banks of Nallah Sukhnag when they were targeted by unknown gunmen, who fled the area after the firing.

The victims were shifted to a hospital, officials said. Initial reports suggested that one of them sustained a bullet injury in the arm and the other, in the leg. Their condition was stated to be stable.

Officials said that security forces have launched a major search operation to trace the attackers.

This is the fourth attack on non-local workers in J&K in the past month. Earlier, militants shot dead a non-local in Shopian and injured another in Pulwama's Tral. In Ganderbal, a militant attack left seven, including six non-locals and one local doctor dead.

Cong. slams EC, says it may take legal route to expunge remarks against the party

The Congress on Friday made a sharp rebuttal to the Election Commission's response to its complaints on the Haryana Assembly election, saying if the poll panel's goal was to "strip itself of the last vestiges of neutrality", then it was doing a "remarkable job" at creating that impress

The principal Opposition party's response came days after the EC rejected allegations of irregularities in the recently concluded Assembly polls and said that the party was raising "the smoke of a generic doubt" about the credibility of an entire electoral outcome as it did in the

In its letter, the Congress claimed that the EC's response was written in a tone that is condescending and indicated that it may take legal recourse to expunge such remarks if the poll panel persists with such language.

The letter was signed by nine senior leaders – K.C. Venugopal, Ashok Gehlot, Bhupinder Hooda, Jairam Ramesh, Pawan Khera, Ajay Maken, Abhishek Singhvi, Uday Bhan, and Partap Bajwa. "We have carefully stu-

died vour response to our complaints. Not surprisingly, the EC has given a clean chit to itself. We would normally have let it be at that. However, the tone and tenor of the EC's response, the language used, and the allegations made against the INC compel us to submit the counter-response," the letter said.

The Congress leaders, who signed the letter, claimed that every reply from the EC now seemed to be laced with ad hominem attacks on either individual leaders or the party itself. They said the Concommunications confined themselves to issues and were written with a regard for the high office of the Chief Election Commissioner and his brother Commissioners.

'Condescending tone' "However, the EC's reply is written in a tone that is condescending," the letter

Patrolling resumes at Demchok, to begin in Depsang on weekend

The Indian and Chinese Armies started coordinated patrolling along the Line of Actual Control in Demchok on Friday, while patrolling in Depsang is expected to commence in a day or so, sources confirmed.

This comes after disengagement was completed on Wednesday in both these areas located in eastern Ladakh, the final friction points from the 2020 stand-off between the two countries. The resumption of patrolling is a significant step in returning to the status quo of pre-April 2020.

Officials from both sides verified the completion of disengagement on the ground in both the areas, Army sources said. Ground commanders, at the rank of Brigadier and below, held meetings on Wednesday to work out the modalities for patrolling. In order to avoid face-offs between patrols and prevent clashes, the timing and frequency of patrols will be coordi-

nated. However, given that there has been a stand-off going on at Demchok since 2017 and that the latest agreement is only to restore the ground situation to the pre-April 2020 situation, it is not clear upto what point the Indian Army will get to patrol in the Demchok area.

At Depsang, where the situation is much more complex, patrolling is expected to resume over the weekend. At least technically, this means that the Indian Army should be able to resume patrols upto the Patrolling Points 10, 11, 11A, 12, and 13 in the area, which it last managed to access in January 2020.

With disengagement now completed at all the friction points of the standoff that began in May 2020, the next step is to work out new patrolling norms and resume patrolling at other friction points as well, such as Galwan, Patrolling Point 15 and 17A in the Gogra Hotsprings area, and the north and south banks of the Pangong Tso.

Congress stands exposed over 'unreal' promises made during elections, says Modi

Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Friday hit out at the Congress, stating that the party was now realising the hard way that making "unreal" promises during election campaigns was easy but implementing them properly was tough or impossible.

"Campaign after campaign they promise things to the people, which they also know they will never be able to deliver. Now, they stand badly exposed in front of the people! FakePromisesOfCongress," Mr. Modi said in a series of posts on X.

The video also shows Mr. Gandhi interacting with workers painting the bungalow.

Vikas Dhoot Noted author, economist


and Padma Shri awardee Bibek Debroy, who had been the Prime Minister's Economic Advisory Council Chairman since 2017, passed away on Friday morning at the age of 69. Mr. Debroy was also a

member of the NITI Aayog, which had replaced the erstwhile Planning Commission, till mid-2019, and had wide-ranging interests beyond economics. He was also a Sanskrit scholar who had translated the Bhagavad Gita, the Vedas, the Ramayana and the Mahabharata; and was working on a project to translate the Puranas as well that remained incomplete.

The veteran economist, who had been ailing for a few weeks, had been admitted to the AIIMS emergency around 10 p.m. on Thursday. Hospital sources said he had "subacute intestinal obstruction" and expired at 7 a.m. on Friday. Leaders across the political spectrum paid lofty tributes to Mr. Debroy.

"Dr. Bibek Debroy Ji was towering scholar... Through his works, he left an indelible mark on India's intellectual landscape. Beyond his contributions to public policy, he enjoyed working on our ancient texts, making them accessible to the youth," Prime Minister Narendra Modi wrote in a post on X.

Congress leader Jairam Ramesh called Mr. Debroy "a man of unusually wideranging interests" who was "first and foremost a fine theoretical and empirical economist who worked and wrote on various aspects of the Indian economy". President Droupadi



Murmu said the country has lost an eminent public intellectual and termed his understanding of India's social, cultural and economic landscape "exceptional".

Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman noted that Mr. Debroy "profusely participated in policy making". "He was prolific in translating Sanskrit to English - our epics and puranas. His book Sarama and Her Children showed his uncanny knack in extracting nuggets from our ancient texts. Bibek, you had so much more to do and to complete - for all our wrote Sitharaman.

Warm, affable and erudite, Mr. Debroy remained a prolific author and co-

lumnist even after joining the NITI Aayog, continuing to shed light and seek on an eclectic variety of issues, including but not restricted to arcane and archaic legislation, and the Indian Railways' history and operational nuances. In his recent public speeches, Mr. Debroy had mooted the need for the country to expeditiously conduct the population Census that has been overdue for a few years, and to revisit key economic metrics, including the poverty line definition.

Early years and career

After his schooling at Ramakrishna Mission School, Narendrapur, Mr. Debroy had studied at Presidency College, Kolkata, followed by the Delhi School of Economics and Trinity College, Cambridge. Starting with a teaching stint at his alma mater Presidency College, Mr. Debroy had worked at the Gokhale Institute of Economics and Politics in Pune, followed by the Indian Institute of Foreign Trade in the national capital.

The economist also spent a year with the Department of Economic Affairs in the Finance Ministry in the mid-1990s, but one of his longest serving roles was the directorship of the Rajiv Gandhi Institute for Contemporary Studies (RGICS) between 1997 and 2005.

At RGICS, a report steered by Mr. Debroy and published in 2005, had created a flutter in the first year of the Manmohan Singh-led UPA regime by naming Gujarat, then under Chief Minister Narendra Modi, as India's top State on an index to measure economic freedom.

This had led to a heated debate on the Gujarat model of development, and amid unease in the Congress ranks, Mr. Debroy eventually moved on to the Punjab Haryana Delhi Chamber of Commerce and Industry or PHDCCI. A two-year stint at the industry body was followed by a long stint at the Centre for Policy and Research from 2007 till he became part of the Centre's think tank after Mr. Modi's government assumed office in 2014.

Mr. Ramesh recalled that Mr. Debroy had a special skill for lucid exposition that would make laypersons easily understand complex economic issues. "Bibek was also a very prolific, and always thought-provoking, commentator in the media," he

Tough fight: NCP chief Ajit Pawar is contesting

Families battle their own in Maharashtra Assembly polls

he upcoming Maharashtra Assembly election is set to be the arena for some bitter family battles, with at least five constituencies seeing clashes between close relatives.

There is a high-octane fight brewing in Baramati, where the Nationalist Congress Party (NCP) chief Ajit Pawar is contesting against his nephew Yugendra Pawar, who is representing the NCP (SP). In Aheri, NCP Minister Dharmarao Baba Atram will face off against his daughter Bhagyashree Atram-Halgekar who has joined the NCP (SP). Yet another fight between families split by the NCP divide is happening in Sindhkhedraja, where Rajendra Shingne who recently joined the NCP (SP) is battling his niece Gayatri Shingne of the NCP.

In the Loha-Kandhar constituency, the NCP's Prataprao Patil Chikhalikar is taking on his brother-in-law, Shyamsunder Shinde of the Peasant and Workers Party. In Nashik's Chandwad constituency, BJP candidate Rahul Aher is contesting against his brother Keda Aher, an Independent candidate.

In the Lok Sabha election, the battle lines between the NCP factions were drawn in the family turf of Baramati, with Mr. Ajit Pawar fielding his wife, Sunetra Pawar, against his cousin Supriya Sule, daughter of party patriarch Sharad Pawar.

The Aheri constituency in Gadchiroli district will witness a heated battle between Mr. Atram and his daughter. In fact, it's a triangular fight among the Atrams of the Aheri royal family, with the sitting MLA's nephew, former BJP Minister Ambrishrao Atram, throwing his hat in the ring as an Independent candidate. Mr. Dharmarao Baba Atram asked voters to throw his daughter and son-in-law into the Pranhita river for treachery. His daughter had an impassioned response: "When my father was abducted in 1991 by Naxalites, it was Sharad Pawar who made his safe release possible. I am paying gratitude for saving my father's life by joining the NCP [SP]." In Nanded, Mr. Chikhalikar, a former BJP MP, has joined the NCP. His brother-in-law, Mr. Shinde won the previous Assembly election with Mr. Chikhalikar's support. This time, they are set to clash, in a fight that originated during an Agricultural Produce Market Committee election.

ith rebellions, internal squabbles within the Mahayuti and the Maha Vikas Aghadi (MVA), and the confusion over nominations, the Maharashtra Assembly election, slated to take place in a single phase on November 20, have confounded many pollsters. Just like the confusion about the seat-sharing formula, the fights will also be clearer only after the last day of the withdrawal of nominations on Novem-

Currently, looking at the nominations which have been filed by the official candidates, rebel Independent candidates, and the smaller parties, Maharashtra is slated to have many multi-cornered fights.

Interestingly, despite the agrarian distress and the unemployment levels, these may not become poll issues, say experts. The key to power will likely be decided by Vidarbha where both the Congress and the BJP are directly pitted against each other. The party which will dominate in the 62 seats in Vidarbha will likely hold the key to Maharashtra's power equation.

This is the first State election where the factions of the Shiv Sena and the Nationalist Congress Party will contest in an all-stakes fight against each other in

Raj's Sena vs Uddhav's Sena: Deepavali gala of one sparks fireworks from the other; ball is now in the court of the EC

The Election Commission (EC) on Friday took cognisance of the Shiv Sena (UBT)'s formal complaint filed against the Maharashtra Navnirman Sena (MNS) chief Raj Thackeray's son Amit Thackeray for allegedly violating the Model Code of Conduct (MCC) with his Deepavali programme held at Shivaji Park on Thursday.

In a letter to the State's Chief Electoral Officer, Shiv Sena (UBT) deputy secretary Sachin Parasnaik complained that the MNS had violated the MCC by celebrating Deepotsav in a State-owned space, insisting that the entire expenses incurred on the event be included as part of the election expenditure of Mr. Amit Thackeray, the MNS candidate from the Mahim constituency.

The EC has set an expenditure limit of ₹40 lakh per candidate in an As-

sembly election.

"The Model Code of Conduct is applicable in the entire State. The BrihanMumbai Municipal Corporation, however, has given its consent to the MNS to celebrate Deepotsav at the Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Park, which is under the civic body's jurisdiction. The MNS has displayed the party banners, installed gates, and put up lanterns in the area. This is a clear violation of the MCC," Mr. Parasnaik said.

"MNS candidate Amit Thackeray was present at the venue at the time of inauguration of Deepotsav. The expenses of Deepotsav should be included in the election expenses of MNS candidate from Mahim assembly seat, Amit Thackeray, as per the stipulated rules," he said, adding that the EC should initiate strict action against the officials responsible for illegally allowing party campaigning in public spaces.

In its reply, the EC said that an investigation into the matter has begun, adding that it has sought a response to the allegations from the MNS.

Defending Mr. Amit Thackeray, MNS leader Bala Nandgaonkar said: "We have been holding the Deepotsav here for many years. This has no connection with Amit Thackeray's campaign. The Shiv Sena (UBT) is objecting to a Hindu festival as it has stopped following the Hindu ideology. They must now officially change their religion."

In Soren's Jharkhand, Hindus are becoming outsiders, says Sarma

Noted fashion designer Rohit Bal, passes away at 63

Rohit Bal, one of India's most celebrated fashion designers, died on Friday at a south Delhi hospital following a heart attack, Fashion Design Council of India president Sunil Sethi said. He was 63. Mr. Bal was admitted to the intensive care unit of a private hospital in Gurugram for cardiac issues in December 2023. In October 2024, he presented his collection at the Lakme Fashion Week X FDCI 2024 grand finale. "He had a cardiac arrest... heart failure. Rohit was a legend, we are completely shaken right now. We are trying to work out details for the cremation tomorrow," Mr. Sethi said. PTI

India silent after U.S. imposes sanctions on 19 Indian entities

Officials have not commented on whether the issue had come up for discussion in a phone call between National Security Adviser Ajit Doval and his U.S. counterpart, Jake Sullivan

ndia has not responded directly to the U.S. decision to put 19 Indian entities under sanctions for providing "dualuse" technologies to Rus-

Calling them "Third-Country Sanctions Evaders", the U.S. Treasury Department on Wednesday imposed sanctions on nearly 400 companies and individuals from 17 countries. On Friday, however, India's Ministry of External Affairs declined to comment, despite several requests for a reaction to the sanctions imposed on a number of Indian companies by the U.S. in a single action against Russia.

Officials also did not comment on whether the issue had been discussed in a phone call between National Security Adviser Ajit Doval and his U.S. counterpart, Jake Sullivan, on Thursday

A readout from the U.S. White House said the two Advisers had discussed "regional security developments, underscoring the need for further efforts to

Closer collaboration

"They also discussed further opportunities for closer collaboration in key domains, including clean energy supply chains and defence cooperation," the readout added, highlighting "progress in the bilateral partnership", through the Initiative on Critical and Emerging Technology (iCET) launched by them in

The Modi government has thus far not responded

to U.S. Treasury sanctions against a number of Indian entities for links to Russia and Iran since 2022, holding only that India "does not recognise unilateral sanctions". According to the U.S. Treasury Department, the U.S. will now freeze all property of the sanctioned companies and owners in the United States and ban all transactions by U.S. citizens with them.

"The United States and our allies will continue to take decisive action across the globe to stop the flow of critical tools and technologies that Russia needs to wage its illegal and immoral war against Ukraine," Deputy Secretary of

the Treasury Wally Adeyemo, said, announcing the sanctions.

The call between the two NSAs, which followed the announcement, came days after India and China announced they had disengaged in the last two pending friction points on the Line of Actual Control, indicating a thaw in ties after four years of a military stand-off. The NSAs spoke amid escalating tensions between India and Canada over the Nijjar killing case, and recent accusations that Home Minister Amit Shah had directed the killing of the Canadian Khalistani activist last year.

When asked, the U.S. State Department spokesperson said the allegations, made by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Commissioner as well as the Deputy Foreign Minister in public comments, were "concerning", and the U.S. government would "continue to consult with the Canadian government about those allegations". The Ministry of External Affairs has thus far not commented on the latest allegations from Canada or the U.S. statement of "concern".

Delhi, Bengaluru firms among those facing sanctions

From the neighbourhoods of Delhi and Uttar Pradesh to Bengaluru and Hyderabad, the individuals and entities facing Russia-related sanctions by the U.S. Treasury Department are scattered across country.

An initial assessment re-

veals that nearly all the entities are well-established companies in their respective domains. They are active in areas such as providing airport support to small and large aircraft and helicopters, spare parts for machines, production of machine tools, IT support, commodities trade and business consultancy service providers. They are suspected of providing dual use goods that are in the Common High Priority List of the U.S. Department of Commerce.

The two individuals who appear in the list are Sudhir Kumar from New Delhi and Vivek Kumar Mishra from Chhattisgarh. As per the website LinkedIn, both are directors in Ascend Aviation.

According to its website, the company deals with a wide range of aircraft-related consumables, ground

support, and spare parts. Another company, Denvas Services Private Ltd. of Delhi, has been accused of being run by several Russian nationals "involved in defence procurement schemes". The U.S. Treasury Department has said that it has been used by Russia to procure "U.S. origin" microelectronics for use in its advanced conventional weapons.

The Bengaluru-based Emsystech has been accused of sending over 800 shipments of electronic integrated circuits and capacitors made with precious metal tantalum to a Russian entity that is active in producing control systems and radio-electronic

The Hyderabad-based Lokesh Machines Ltd., a machine tools manufacturer, has been accused of collaborating with a Russian defence agent, Alikhanov or Dimitri Vladimirovich Alikhanov.

The Gurugram-based Innovio Ventures has been accused of sending "over 200 shipments, including electronic integrated circuits and multilayer ceramic capacitors to Russiabased end-users" that included Russian military entity Testkomplekt.

India spells out finance needs for biodiversity, conservation

India expects to spend around ₹81,664 crore on biodiversity and conservation from the financial year 2025 to 2030. From 2018 to 2022, India spent ₹32,207 crore, and to meet the higher financing requirements would require funds from sources beyond routine government expendi ture, the country stated in its updated submission at the ongoing 16th edition of Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD) in Colombia (COP-16).

The expenditure from 2018 to 2022 was purely that expended by the Centre as allocations to various Ministries or statutory bodies for the conservation and biodiversitylinked programmes.

Indian officials at the conference said international finance would be necessary to meet these goals. "I would like to men-

tion that it is necessary to provide means of implementation, including financial resources, as laid down in target 19 of the Kunming Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework (KMGBF) as well as from Digital Sequence Information (DSI), for implementation of the National Biodiversity Strategies and Action Plans (NBSAP)," Kirti Vardhan Singh, Minister of State (Environment), said at the convention. "Lot of ground needs to be covered in providing easily

accessible means of imple-

mentation, i.e. financial resources, technology and capacity building needs with the requisite speed, scope and scale."

The KMGBF refers to biodiversity goals previously agreed upon by countries to reverse and stop biodiversity loss by 2030.

The DSI is one of the agreements currently being debated upon by countries in Colombia and deals with equitably sharing the benefits from uploading genetic data of organisms in global databases.

Sickness, infirmity are grounds for bail in PMLA case, says SC

The Supreme Court has highlighted that sickness and infirmity of an accused are grounds for bail even under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA).

A three-judge Bench neaded by Chief Justice of India D.Y. Chandrachud, in a recent order, highlighted the leeway given to an ailing accused under the antimoney laundering law while allowing interim bail to Amar Sadhuram Mulchandani, former Chairperson of Seva Vikas Cooperative Bank.

The proviso to Section 45(1) of the PMLA specifically contemplates that a person who "is sick or infirm" may be released on bail if the Special Court so directs.

Section 45 of the Prevention of Money Launder-

ing Act, 2002 or PMLA covers bail. Clause (1) of Section 45 is stringent the accused would get bail only if the court was satisfied there were reasonable grounds for believing they were not guilty. Further, the court should be satisfied that the accused would not commit any offence while out on bail These twin conditions make getting bail in the PMLA cases an almost impossible task.

However, the proviso to clause (1) of Section 45 allows courts the discretion to exempt persons below 16 years of age, women, the sick or the infirm from these dual conditions for bail, providing humane relief.

In the current case, the court noted that Mr. Mulchandani was 67 years old and had already spent nearly a year and three months in custody.

Man 'behind' hoax threats surrenders in Nagpur: police

A 35-year-old man who was allegedly behind a series of hoax bomb threats to airports and railway stations across the country has been arrested after he presented himself before the Nagpur Police, an official said on Friday

Jagdish Shriam Uikey, resident of Arjuni Morgaon in Gondia district of eastern Maharashtra, arrived in Nagpur by flight after the city police sent him a notice seeking his presence for probe, and surrendered on Thursday evening, he said.

Mr. Uikey operated from Delhi, the official said. An email allegedly sent by him to Railway Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw and railway police authorities on October 21 had led to increased security measures at railway stations too.

Naga group urges Centre to finalise peace deal this year

The Naga National Political Groups (NNPG) said on Thursday that the Union government should finalise the Naga peace pact according to the terms of the agreement signed with the group in 2019, the provisions of which include a separate page in the Indian passport for the Nagas and a bicameral legislature in

Nagaland. The NNPG said the political solution reached with the Union government fully recognised the Naga identity, with a separate page in the Indian passport, a separate contingent of Nagas in all international events, and an enhanced representation in both Houses of Parliament.

The NNPG, which is the second group after the influential Isak-Muivah faction of the National SocialThe NNPG is the second group to engage in peace talks with the Centre

ist Council of Nagaland (NSCN-IM) to engage in peace talks with the Union government, signed an "Agreed Position" on tober 31, 2019, with the then Naga interlocutor, R.N. Ravi, currently Tamil Nadu's Governor.

"The NNPG hopes that the Government of India will complete the signing of the agreement in 2024 itself," a statement by the NNPG, which comprises seven groups, said.

It said the 'Agreed Position' had the status of an "intergovernmental agreement" as the NNPG working committee had signed it with Mr. Ravi, who was holding a Cabinet rank in the government.



Life is always inlaid with happiness and sorrow. One seeks material wealth only to realise one cannot enjoy many things money can buy because one's health does not permit it. One should not measure happiness by sensory gratification or by the end of one's worldly troubles; true happiness lies in working towards and attaining liberation. Vaikuntam (constantly being in the presence of Perumal, like the *nityasuris*) and serving the Lord is true happiness.

How does one attain such a state? *Perumal* is the *pa*ramporul (Supreme Being) but our senses cannot perceive this. We can learn about Him only through the Vedas, and the personification of Vedas is Garuda, said Velukkudi Ranganathan in a discourse.

Referred to as Periya Tiruvadi (as he carries Perumal on his shoulder), Garuda is a devotee, friend, the vehicle, the seat, the dhwaja (flag, meaning whoever comes under it will be offered protection), protective cloak and also serves as a fan. He serves the Lord in every situation, showing bhaktas the way forward to serve Him, who is always fond of His devotees and will not brook anyone treating them with disfavour, as Duryodhana did. When Krishna chose to partake of Vidhura's hospitality, rather than Duroydhana's, the Lord stated that as per sastras, one cannot eat in an enemy's house. The Kaurava prince replied, "There is no enmity between us." To this, Krishna said, "Not directly. However, you hate the Pandavas, who are my bhaktas. How can I overlook that?" Nammazhwar too says God will protect His devotees. It is Garuda who brings Perumal tirelessly whenever bhaktas call him. It is Vishnu Himself who asked Garuda to be His vehicle.



But the market leader's domestic sales contracted 5.12% to 1,63,130 units, eve as its utility vehicle (UV) brands such as Brezza, Ertiga, Fronx, Grand Vitara, Invicto, Jimny, XL6 saw a growth of over 19% to hit 70,644 units, indicating a persistent preference for SUVs and UVs over cheaper sedans and hatchbacks.

Hyundai Motor India Ltd. (HMIL) reported domestic sales of 55,568 units compared with 55,128 units a year ago, up 0.8%. Overall, SUVs' contribution to domestic sales remained at 68.2% in the month.

Exports rose 6.7% to

14,510 units, while total sales inched up 2%.

Tarun Garg, whole time director and COO, HMIL said they witnessed a strong demand for SUVs during festive period, with the highest-ever monthly sales of 37,902 units."

Tata Motors' sales remained almost unchanged at 82,682 units. Mahindra & Mahindra Ltd. sold a total of 96,648 vehicles, including exports, up 20%.

TVS Motor Company recorded a monthly sales of 4,89,015 units of two- and three-wheelers, up 13% from 4,34,714 units in the same month of 2023...

Tim Cook says Apple's India revenue at all-time high

iPhone maker Apple has set an all-time revenue record in India and observed a double-digit growth in iPad sales in the country in the September quarter, the company's top official said on Friday.

Apple reported an over 6% growth in total net sales to \$94.93 billion during the reported period from \$89.49 billion a year ago.

"We also set September quarter segment revenue records in the Americas, Europe, and the rest of Asia Pacific, as well as in a large number of countries, including the United States, Brazil, Mexico, France, the U.K., Korea, Malaysia, Thailand, Saudi Arabia and the UAE, and we continue to be excited by the enthusiasm we're seeing in India, where we set an all-time revenue record," Apple CEO Tim Cook said during the company's earnings call.

Mr. Cook said Apple also opened two new stores – one in Mumbai and the other in Delhi - in India during the quarter.

"We can't wait to bring four new stores to customers in India," he said.

In early October, Apple announced plans to open four more stores in India, in Pune, Bengaluru, Delhi-NCR and Mumbai.

As per Counterpoint Research, Apple iPhone sales accounted for 21.6% market share in value terms in the September quarter in India. It trailed Samsung by a small margin.

Festivities trigger buying spree in India, but volumes lag

Gold demand in India jumped this week amid festival purchases, although volumes were lower than usual due to the metal's record-high prices.

"Retail buying jumped as consumers want to make purchases during the auspicious period. But many were making tokenbuys because of higher prices," said a Hyderabadbased jeweller.

In India, prices jumped to a record high of ₹79,775 per 10 grams earlier this week, marking a nearly 33% increase since last year's Dipawali.



The share of coins and bars in total sales increased this year than usual as buyers were unwilling to pay increased making charges for jewellery, said a New Delhibased jeweller.

Indian dealers earlier

this week charged a premium of up to \$1 an ounce over official domestic prices on Dhanteras, inclusive of 6% import and 3% sales levies, but offered a discount later in the week of up to \$5, compared with last week's \$4 discount.

"In volumes, sales were lower this year than last vear. However, considering the price rally, even sales with modest volume drops look promising since, in value terms, they are much higher," said a Mumbaibased bullion dealer with a private bank. Dipawali and Dhanteras are festivals when buying gold is considered auspicious.

An ancestral village and its bond with a prodigal son

A country road snakes past coconut groves, the rare paddy farm and homes, both ancient with wooden rafters and Mangalore tiles, and modern with embellishments procured through the money-order economy bolstered from West Asia. This is perhaps a regular vista in any Kerala village linked to a nearby town and Madapeedika is no exception. But this is no ordinary road.

Located in Kerala's northern parts, popularly known as Malabar, and shoe-horned between the coastal town of Thalassery and the former French enclave of Mahe, now a part of Puducherry, Madapeedika has a bus-stop fringed by bakeries and provision shops. It is a junction with one road heading back towards Thalassery, another moves to Chokli, the third to Paral and Mahe and the fourth, a bit narrow, leads into the adjoining villages.

This specific pathway not just tapers into a sylvan landscape but it also guides us towards the ancestral roots of T.P. Gopalan Nambiar, the corporate patriarch, who passed away in Bengaluru on Thursday (October 31).

Popularly known as 'BPL' Nambiar in this part of Kerala, a nomenclature linked to the firm he headed for a large part, he has always drawn respect and awe from the people of his home-village.

Grandmothers long memories often recall his younger days as a lad clambering up the little hillock, plucking mangoes and also keeping an eye on cashew fruit in the terraced plantations. Naughty and rooted were the terms

they often used to describe a young Mr. TPG Nambiar. Years later, as he grew

and evolved and kept Bengaluru as his base while having a BPL factory in Palakkad, the village still remained close to his heart.

And it was no surprise when some residents in and around Madapeedika in Kodiyeri Panchayat, got opportunities to work in the Palakkad establishment. As BPL diversified, Mr. TPG Nambiar got busy but he found time to make a dash to his village.

He would drive down from Bengaluru and it was benevolence that helped the village get a road leading all the way into the hinterland close to the old home where his relatives stayed.

"The road that Nambiar built," is an oft-quoted reference before Google Maps stepped in. Those were the days when the Kannur Airport was a distant dream and connectivity was restricted to overnight buses or trains towards Thalassery and Mahe or the odd private vehicle.

However, as age caught up and BPL went through a downswing, Mr. TPG Nambiar's visits dwindled even as villagers remembered the chauffeur-driven car in which he used to arrive and the help he offered without any fuss.

He has departed at 94 but in Northern Kerala, especially around Madapeedika, he would be remembered forever. Like the late Captain Krishnan Nair, who hailed from the same Kannur District, and helmed the Leela Group of Hotels, Mr. TPG Nambiar will remain a corporate hero in Malabar.



Striking **Boeing staff** to vote on 38% pay-rise deal

Striking Boeing workers on the U.S. West Coast will vote on an improved contract offer on Monday, which includes a 38% pay rise over four years and a bigger signing bonus, their union said on Thursday.


More than 30,000 factory workers who produce Boeing's strongest-selling 737 MAX commercial jet and other planes have been on strike since September 13 and rejected two earlier offers from Boeing.

Boeing's latest offer includes a \$12,000 ratification bonus and the reinstatement of an annual bonus scheme that was not included in a previous offer, The International Association of Machinists and Aerospace Workers said. IAM said it was endorsing the offer ahead of the vote.

Workers have been pushing for a 40% wage increase and the return of a defined-benefit pension that they lost a decade ago.

Last week, some 64% of the planemaker's U.S. West Coast factory workers rejected an offer of a 35% general wage increase over four years that was not endorsed by the union. Boeing shares rose 2.5%

in after-hours trading after the offer was announced following an exclusive report by Reuters.

With the result all set to go down to the wire, the focus of Democrat Kamala Harris in the last week of the presidential poll campaign is on getting sceptics within the camp to get out and vote. Her key allies in this pursuit are former President Barack Obama and independent Senator Bernie Sanders who have made repeated pleas to social groups that traditionally supported the Democrats but are unenthused about voting for Ms. Harris.

More than 60 million votes have already been cast as of Thursday. Voting concludes on November 5. Ms. Harris and her Republican opponent Donald J. Trump are urging the rest not to miss voting, but hesitant supporters may be more a concern for the former than the latter.

Ms. Harris has attempted to stitch together a coalition of extremes - from socialists to neocons and sections of everyone in between. Proponents of contradictory strands agree that a second presidency of Republican Donald Trump would be far worse for all of them

than having Ms. Harris at the top. Key issues that confuse the Democratic base are the party's, and specifically the candidate's, approach towards Israel, the working class and corporate interests. Opinion polls suggested discontent among African Americans and Latinos too - communities that Democratic strategists have traditionally taken for granted.

Independent Senator Bernie Sanders addressed young voters, the working class, Israel critics and Palestinian supporters who are sceptical about Ms. Harris in recent days with the specific warning –"Donald Trump and his rightwing friends are worse."

Mr. Sanders had one message to his supporters – Ms. Harris may not be the best on the question of unrestrained support for Israel Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's expanding war in West Asia and on working-class rights vis a vis corporation, but she is better than Mr. Trump.

By acknowledging the grievance of the party's own base, Mr. Sanders is deviating from the official campaign tone of euphoria, to win over the the disgruntled sections back.

In his latest message, Mr. Obama addressed Black men yet again. "As we enter the final moments of the campaign, President Obama reminds us that you are the most credible messengers," campaign group Win With Black Men posted along with a video message from the former President. Mr. Obama had publicly noted a lack of enthusiasm among African American men and linked that to Ms. Harris being a woman.

Neither Mr. Trump nor Ms. Harris has been able to frame the contest around their most favourable question, immigration and abortion, respectively. Ms. Harris has a bevy of Republicans, particularly neocons, rooting for her, but their impact on the electorate is unlikely to be signil icant. What could be consequential will be her ability to hold the Democratic camp together and active in the last lap, in swing States.

Trump and Harris extend Deepavali greetings

The U.S. presidential candidates, Republican Donald Trump and Democrat Kamala Harris, extended Deepavali wishes to all, with the former also promising to "protect Hindu Americans against the antireligion agenda of the radical left".

Mr. Trump termed Prime Minister Narendra Modi a "good friend," accused Ms. Harris and President Joe Biden of ignoring the Hindus and condemned the violence in Bangladesh. "...strongly condemn the barbaric violence against Hindus, Christians, and other minorities who are getting attacked and looted by mobs in Bangladesh, which remains in a total state of chaos," Mr. Trump said in a post on social media.

A shorter message from Ms. Harris said: "Tonight, we join more than 1 billion people across America and around the world lighting diyas and celebrating the fight for good over evil, knowledge over ignorance, and light over darkness-...Happy Diwali to eve ryone celebrating the Festival of Lights." In the evening the Vice President also posted a photo of her residence lit for the occasion.

U.S., Moscow

on 'brink' of direct conflict. Lavrov warns

The United States and Russia are very close to engaging in "direct military conflict," Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov warned in an interview published on Friday in a Turkiye daily, just days ahead of a U.S. presidential election.

"Under the current president (Joe Biden), who has taken the downward spiral of Russophobia in the U.S. to its logical conclusion, our countries are on the brink of direct military conflict," he told the Hurriyet daily, without elaborating.

Asked about next week's U.S. election pitting former Republican President Donald Trump against Democratic nominee and Vice-President Kamala Harris, Mr. Lavrov said the outcome would make little difference to Russia.

No preference

"We have no preference. When the Trump administration was in power, it adopted the highest number of anti-Russian sanctions compared to its predecessors," he said.

"No matter who wins the elections, we don't think the United States' anti-Russian bent can change."





Gukesh brooks no complacency as he readies forces for World title assault

The 18-year-old has an opportunity to become the youngest World chess champion, with many observers — including several top players — expecting him to defeat Ding Liren. But Gukesh isn't taking the Chinese defending champion, whom he is yet to beat in a classical game, lightly

ot often does a teenaged challenger start as the overwhelming favourite against the experienced champion. D. Gukesh is very much conscious of the fact that most people – including some of the world's top players - expect him to beat Ding Liren in the World chess championship match, which begins in Singapore on November 25.

During a recent online interaction with select media, including The Hindu, the 18-year-old made it clear that such expectations did not put undue pressure on him. "It doesn't really add pressure," he said. "I am glad that people say this

People are saying so because of two factors: Gukesh enters the World title match after playing some remarkably solid chess for quite some time, including a superlative display at the Chess Olympiad, where he led India to the team gold in the most convincing of manners; Ding, on the other hand, has been in awful form and questions have been raised about his mental health.

The 32-year-old revealed that he had consulted a psychologist. "It doesn't seem like I've been playing the way I used to," Ding said in a recent interview to Singapore's The Straits Times. "The assessment is correct and I don't know if I will ever reach that level again."

He had taken a nine-month break after becoming only the second Asian to win the World chess championship last year, defeating Russia's Ian Nepomniachtchi. "I feel as per normal, the doctor has given some advice," he said. "Recently, I have been playing basketball after dinner, trying not to give myself too much stress."

He said he was feeling okay. "Neither good nor bad," he elaborated. "I'm not at my lowest and have walked out of the darkness from the last one and a half years... I have moved past that now and I feel like I have been playing decent chess but have not been winning.

If you are a fan of Ding, all of that will not make for easy reading. But it may not be wise to write him off easily.

World No. 2 Hikaru Nakamura has gone on record saving that Gukesh's chances against Ding at the World championship are 80-20. World No. 1 Carlsen has said Gukesh has a significant advantage and that if he strikes first, he will win the match without trouble. The five-time World champion from Norway, whose abdication led to the crowning of Ding, believes that denying that first strike could work for the Chinese.

The World championship is a long affair, especially by today's standards. But back in 1984-85, reigning champion Anatoly Karpov took on Garry Kasparov in an all-Soviet Union battle that didn't produce a winner even after five months and 48 games. It took another 24 games in late 1985 before Kasparov began his long reign as the World champion.

That two-year-long World championship match was a classic; it was a thriller even, of the slow-burning variety. Kasparov, in the first stage of the match, was trailing 0-5, and Karpov needed only one more win. But, the younger man fought back from the brink of defeat and staged an astonishing fightback.

The games played by the two Ks from those historical matches are still savoured by fans of classical chess. The Singapore match will be of much shorter duration.

Most people reckon Gukesh might not need those tie-breakers. The Chennai lad, however, insists he sees it as a match against a strong player.

"And I'm sure he will be coming to the match with the right spirit and he'll be trying his best," he said during the online chat. "My approach is to treat every game with the utmost respect and energy and give it my best."

He said he had prepared for a possible clash with Ding at the Chess Olympiad in Budapest, as India was drawn to play China in the seventh round. But, China chose to rest Ding for that match and thus the most anticipated game at the Olympiad did not happen at all. It would have been a teaser for the World title match.

"On the rest day before the match against China, we thought it was very likely he would play but there was a slight chance that he might not want to because he lost the previous round," said Gukesh. "I was ready for both scenarios, and it was not a huge surprise when he decided to rest that game. It doesn't make a huge difference. Obviously, it's tough for anyone to play after a loss, and it's very understandable that he didn't want to play. We already played in the Sinquefield Cup, so we got a bit of a teaser before the match."

That game in the Sinquefield Cup had ended in a draw. It was the fifth classical game they were playing against each other. Two other games had been drawn, while Ding won twice. Yes, that means Gukesh hasn't beaten Ding yet in a classical game of chess.

In Budapest, China had fielded Wei Yi instead of Ding for the top board clash against Gukesh. The way he won that end-game, converting the small advantage he had slowly into the full point, is an excellent example of the progress Gukesh has made as a player. That was Carlsenesque.

Adding a layer

Former World No. 3 Anish Giri told *The Hindu* that Gukesh was now a different player. "He has added a solid layer to his play because he was always good at generating chances, at going for uncompromising chess but he didn't have a solid backup," he said. "So now Gukesh is this player who has two modes. He can create a fight and try to do this sort of dogfight type thing, but he can also, if he needs a draw, shut you down. That makes him very strong."

Gukesh's strength was very evident when he won the Candidates tournament – the qualifying event for the World title match - at Toronto earlier this year. After making it to the event at the last minute, following the Chennai Grand Masters, he played superbly to win the Candidates that featured the likes of Nakamura, Fabiano Caruana, Nepomniachtchi and compatriots R. Praggnanandhaa and Vidit Gujrathi.

Gukesh had become the youngest to win the Candidates. In Singapore, he has an opportunity to become the youngest World chess champion in history - that too, by beating Kasparov's record by four years.

I want to be a complete batter and a complete spinner: Tanush Kotian's mission statement

The Mumbai all-rounder's consistent match-winning feats have catapulted him into national reckoning. Judging by the challenges he has overcome so far, as well as his clear-headed approach to cricket, the 26-year-old will be keen to test himself on India-A's tour of Australia

great bowler can make the ball talk!"

The wallpaper on his mobile phone has the text embossed next

to his off-break-bowling action.
"I keep changing the wallpaper but for the last few weeks, I have stuck to this," he says.

They used to pen their frame of mind into a diary once upon a time. For Gen Z, the wallpaper is a sneak peek into their thought-process. And the best place to let a cricketer spell out his mindset is... obviously a cricket ground.

Days after he played a pivotal role in ending Mumbai's 27-year wait for the Irani Cup, one sits down with Tanush Kotian – the lanky all-rounder from Vikhroli, a Mumbai suburb – at the Sharad Pawar Cricket Academy ground.

The facility – a breeding ground for age-group and senior cricketers alike - has been his comfort zone. But it has taken him a struggle of well over a decade to earn his comfort zone.

By the time you read this, he will be a member of India-A – the almost-there group - on its shadow tour of Australia ahead of the Border-Gavaskar Trophy. But making it to the national selectors' targeted pool has been a topsy-turvy ride.

Flashback one

Two years ago, Kotian – who turned 26 last month – was in unsure territory – the kind of position that he loves to have a batter in, ball in

He had emerged as the Player of the Match in

the 2022 Syed Mushtaq Ali Trophy final, picking up three for 15 and sealing Mumbai's win with a six in the last over. Several franchises called him for trials ahead of the Indian Premier League auction. He was billed as one of the possible entrants into the crorepati club.

But a few hours before the IDL auction, disas-

But a few hours before the IPL auction, disaster struck. The franchises were informed that Kotian's bowling action was seen as "suspect" alth-

ough he had never been reported in any domestic game. He later discovered that a match referee, in consultation with the on-field umpires, had found just one ball suspicious during the SMA Trophy.

Kotian was never barred from bowling, but that was it! The franchises' interest dropped.

"Now when I look back, I realise that the whole episode triggered my will to succeed at any cost. Someone else may have dropped his shoulders after such an episode but I got more determined to prove all my detractors wrong and show my real mettle," says Kotian.

Earlier in 2022, Kotian – along with fellow all-rounder Shams Mulani – had bailed Mumbai out of a precarious situation against Goa in the Ranji Trophy. That innings of 98 set Mumbai on course for the final and dispelled all the doubts over whether he had it in him at a higher level.

Flashback two

A majority of cricketers in India – especially in Mumbai – are made because of their fathers wanting their kids – not just sons now, thankfully – to achieve what they couldn't.

Tanush was no different. Karunakar – a legend in tennis-ball cricket, 'tennis cricket' in Bambaiya parlance – was a formative influence. Like his father, a young Tanush used to hit the ball hard and run in and bowl as fast as he could. But the youngster gradually developed a fondness for turn-

ing the ball. And unlike most pushy fathers, Karunakar let him be.

"He has always been supportive, never pushy," stresses Tanush. "And him being a cricketer has always been a help. He has helped me analyse my game better. And he knows what's going through my head after a good or a bad day at the ground."

Switching to a "cricket school" – the VN Sule Guruji School in Dadar – in the seventh grade made him realise the hard yards he needed to put in. "Till then, I was among the better ones in and around Vikhroli. Once I started playing in the toptier of inter-school, I realised that I was one among dozens of cricketers who were competing to break into Mumbai's age-group teams. I had to work harder than ever before if I had to survive first, and then succeed, at that level."

Working hard was never going to be a problem, especially for a teenager willing to spend 13 to 14 hours away from home every day in his quest to convert his passion into a profession.

Flashback three

Given these struggles, it was no surprise that Karunakar shed tears of happiness at the Wankhede Stadium this March. Tanush had not only helped Mumbai regain the Ranji Trophy but was also adjudged the Player of the Tournament.

"That has been his proudest moment so far. I just hope he will have a few more moments to savour in the next few years," says Tanush.

A return of 502 runs – including a hundred while batting at No. 10 – and 29 wickets catapulted him into national reckoning. It also led Rajasthan Royals to sign him, as a replacement for Adam Zampa, a welcome turn of events after the snub of 2022.

Kotian got just one opportunity to showcase his talent, that too as an opening batter, and wasn't required to bowl. But right through those two months, he chased the three senior spinners – "Ash bhai, Yuzi bhai and Keshav" – for what he terms "learnings for a lifetime".

"Those two months were an education. When you have Ashwin, Chahal and Maharaj to learn from – not just by watching them prepare and bowl but even available to chat and help you out in the nets – what more can you ask for?"

The present: batting or bowling all-rounder?

While he was thrilled with his IPL experience, the manner in which he was utilised against Punjab Kings in April also led to murmurs in Indian cricket circles about whether he was a batting or bowling all-rounder.

The man himself wasn't surprised. After all, he had been dealing with such queries ever since he broke into Mumbai's under-14 squad in 2013.

Early in his career, when he started visiting coach Rajesh Sanil's nets for batting drills, Sanil gave him advice that he has etched onto his mind.

"Rajesh Sanil sir told me it doesn't matter what number you are batting at, treat yourself as a batsman and build your innings accordingly. Even while bowling, he and Pappa [father] tell me to think like a batter so that I can set the batter up.

"In short, all along I have been told and have thought that I don't want to be a batting all-rounder or a bowling all-rounder. No one should take me lightly in any department. Call me a 50-50 or whatever, I want to be a complete batter and a com-

plete spinner."
As Kotian leaves to pick up his kit-bag, one can't help but think that, given the challenges he has overcome so far and his simple, clear approach to cricket, the 26-year-old will do everything in his power to achieve that ambition.
